

Progress Report on Key Senate Majority Priorities:

Controlling Spending

- Closed nearly \$15 billion in budget gaps, without raising taxes on middle class New Yorkers

- ➤ This self-imposed 2% cap has saved \$18.3 billion over 3 years -- protecting taxpayers from \$3,268 in higher taxes

Turning Dysfunction Into Progress 2013 LEGISLATIVE ACCOMPLISHMENTS





New York State Senate REPUBLICAN CONFERENCE

2013 Legislative Accomplishments: In addition to a fiscally responsible State Budget, the 2013 Session produced agreements on important legislation in a wide array of issue areas. These include:

Protecting the Disabled: This measure helps to avoid major state funding cuts that would have diminished the level of services currently provided to thousands of New Yorkers with developmental disabilities. (PBH - S4777D)

Breast Cancer Research: This measure provides additional resources for lifesaving research, by allowing funding from the Breast Cancer Research and Education Fund to be used towards breast cancer mapping initiatives. (PBH, S3768)

Newborn Heart Screenings: This important public health measure will save lives through earlier detection of possible heart defects in newborn babies. It requires hospitals and other health care institutions to screen newborn babies for congenital heart defects. (PBH S270B)

Autism: This legislation will ensure that individuals with autism are able to receive insurance coverage for applied behavioral analysis (ABA) therapy as intended under New York State's autism insurance reform law. (S4862B)

Protecting Child Victims: This legislation provides key protections to child victims who have been severely abused by their parents or guardians. It improves Family Court procedures to reduce the trauma abused children can potentially experience and helps expedite the finding of a new, permanent home. (PBH, S4082)

Texting and Talking While Driving:

This legislation increases the safety of roads and drivers by strengthening penalties for teens and other new drivers who text or talk on a cell phone while driving. It requires suspension of licenses for newly licensed drivers if they commit distracted driving offenses. (PBH, S5656)

Renewable Energy: This measure will help reduce fossil fuel consumption and support new job growth in the clean energy sector by making installation of renewable energy technologies more cost efficient and accessible to potential consumers. (PBH, S1111)

Caring for the Elderly: This measure makes it easier and less expensive for legal guardians caring for the elderly or other relatives living out-of-state to carry out their responsibilities. It assists New Yorkers caring for adults in other states, as well as out-of-state individuals caring for elderly New Yorkers when they seek approval to fulfill health care, financial, and other legal responsibilities across state lines. (PBH, \$2534)

Pet Lemon Law Extensions: The measure would give allow consumers more protections when purchasing a pet. The bill would provide consumers with more information about the origins of their pet, and more protections should their pet become ill, under what is known as the "pet lemon law." (PBH, S3723B)

Farm-to-Senior Program: This measure creates a farm-to-senior program to promote the purchase of New York farm products by senior centers and other institutions for the aging. It mirrors a similar effort, the farm-to-school program, which was established in 2002 to enable schools to purchase locally-grown farm produce for school children. (PBH, S2149)

Net Metering: This legislation helps more farms, municipalities and other non-residential customers receive the cost-cutting and environmentally sound benefits of remote net metering. (PBH, S4514)

Local Government Finances: The Senate approved legislation to help municipalities across the State overcome the many fiscal challenges they face. It creates a new restructuring board that will provide both technical assistance and grants designed to strengthen the fiscal stability of local governments without hurting taxpayers. (PBH, S5865)
