Reed toasts Finger Lakes in S. Korea

CORNING | U.S. Rep. Tom Reed used his first overseas trip to help promote the sale of Finger Lakes wine in South Korea.

Reed, R-Corning, said he was visiting Korea as part of the Mutual Educational Cultural Exchange Act, which was funded by the Korean government.

Reed said he's working to build relationships with Korean wine importers to create potential markets for New York state wines.

In February, Reed joined 66 other members of Congress in urging President Obama to sign a trade agreement with South Korea.

Secretary of State Hillary Clinton said Sunday the Obama administration was committed to passing a free trade agreement with South Korea this year.

Reed spokesman Tim Kolpien said the Senate will be taking up trade agreements with Columbia, Panama and South Korea together as one package.

He said this should be done within the next two months.

U.S. Rep. Dave Camp, R-Mich., chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, said he'd like to see a bill from the

Senate by July 1. In a press release in March, Reed said the trade agreement would mean the Korean duties on American grape juice

eliminated. Opening the South Korean market to Finger Lakes wines could mean millions of dollars to area wineries, Reed said.


