WHEREAS, With a passion for gardening, Dorothy Pelkey always had a large vegetable garden and picked hundreds of pints of blueberries and wild strawberries from which she would make jam; she also picked apples and potatoes in the fall; and

WHEREAS, A woman of indomitable faith and dedication, Dorothy and her husband were very active in the church of Saint Louis of France in Sciota, New York, helping with harvest dinners and walking children to religion classes; she also taught religion for many years; and

WHEREAS, Today, Dorothy Pelkey remains active in the Senior Housing building where she lives independently; she helps plan and prepare gatherings, such as monthly pot-luck luncheons and summertime yard sales for which she bakes several loaves of bread; she also loves playing bingo, card games, making puzzles, and checking scratch off tickets she often gets as gifts; and

WHEREAS, While she is passionate about many things, above all her greatest love is her family; in addition to her five children, she has

nine grandchildren, 13 great-grandchildren, and eight great-great-grandchildren; and

WHEREAS, Dorothy Pelkey, with her zest for life, has inspired and enhanced the lives of her family and friends; and
