The drive saw an overwhelming response from the community and local organizations, demonstrating a shared commitment to promoting equity and access to vital resources.

As Chair of the Women's Issues Committee in the New York State Senate, Senator Webb launched the initiative to address the growing need for menstrual products in the region. The campaign was carried out in partnership with local organizations including Binghamton Metro Doulas, C4 Cortland Communities of Color, and Downtown Ithaca Alliance, who helped organize drop-off locations and encouraged widespread participation.
