

## Senator Amedore Secures \$25,000 for Wildwood Programs

The impact of this funding will benefit both programs for many years to come. We are very grateful to Senator Amedore for his continued advocacy and commitment to people and families living with disabilities."

Wildwood's Adult Education Program serves individuals with developmental disabilities and complex learning disabilities who are over the age of 18. Its purpose is to actively engage adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities in lifelong learning. Both classroom instruction and "real life" experiential learning are offered in such areas as reading, GED preparation, financial literacy, vocational exploration and training, computer skills, cooking, wellness and fitness activities, social skill development, leisure skills and fostering independence in activities of daily living.

The program collaborates with all other programs at Wildwood and networks with local disability organizations in 14 counties, as well as local, state and national organizations.
