Earlier this year, the Senate passed the Violence Against Nurses bill which makes assaulting a registered nurse (RN) or licensed practical nurse (LPN) a felony. According to the U.S. Department of Justice, about 500,000 nurses are victims of workplace violence every year, resulting in RNs and LPNs suffering from the highest proportion of workplace injuries in the healthcare field. Providing for a felony charge against those who assault an RN or LPN will encourage employers to address violence that might occur in the workplace. This bill is a positive step for the increased safety of all nurses.
