SENECA FALLS – Senator Pam Helming recognized the centennial of Seneca County Cornell Cooperative Extension and Seneca County Farm Bureau during a celebration on Saturday, Dec. 9 at Rodman Lott & Son Farms in Seneca Falls. The charter founding the Seneca County Farm Bureau, which at the time included Cooperative Extension, was signed on Dec. 29, 1917. In 1955, a congressional order separated Farm Bureau and Cooperative Extension. Today, the Farm Bureau is dedicated to supporting and enriching agriculture and lobbying on issues that directly impact farmers. Meanwhile, Cooperative Extension continues in its research and education role on topics such as agriculture, nutrition, and health to improve our communities and strengthen agriculture.
