

Senator Comrie Hosts Annual Event to Highlight Women's Health Issues

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Jamaica, NY — State Senator Leroy Comrie and community partners on Saturday hosted the Second Annual Women's Health Empowerment Symposium. The event, which celebrates Women's History Month through health and wellness education, drew over 175 participants from across Southeast Queens.

Senator Comrie collaborated with Healthfirst, the Healthcare Education Project (HEP), and

York College to bring community members together to participate in discussions and workshops on many of the important topics of women's health, including obesity, cervical cancer, mental health, and endometriosis.

"I represent some of the most engaged and diverse communities in the entire state, so I am very fortunate to be able to work alongside organizations like Healthfirst, HEP, and York College to host comprehensive educational events like the Women's Health Empowerment Symposium," said Senator Comrie. Twelve experts representing various fields of medicine and wellness presented on their work throughout the morning and afternoon.
