Helming Celebrates World Down Syndrome Day With ‘Lots of Socks’

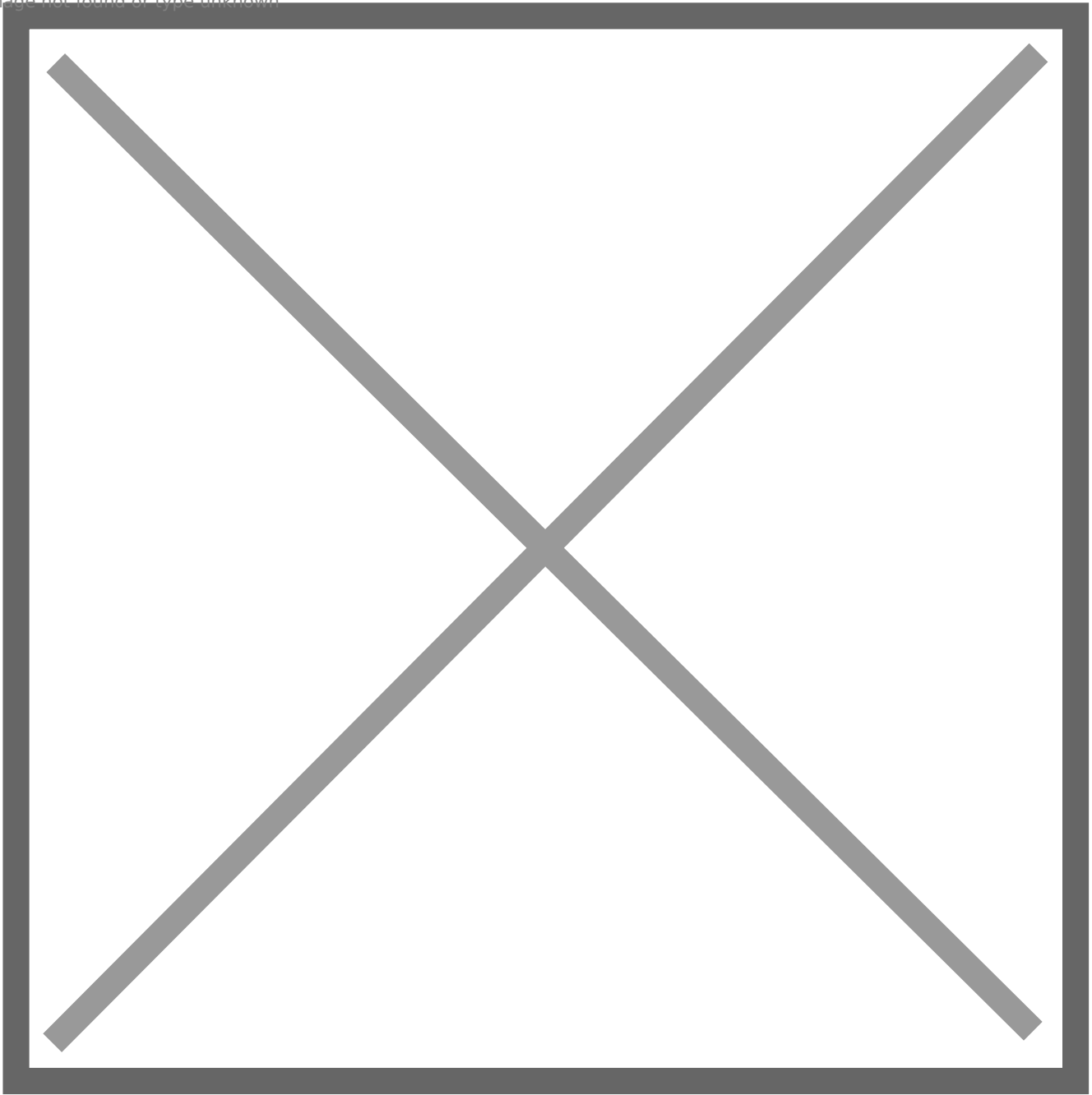
