planet, I host a special "Earth Day Poster Contest" each year for local students to take part in.

The theme of the annual contest, which is open to children in grades kindergarten through 6 th, is "Reduce, Reuse, Recycle". Children are asked to design a special poster that through their creativity shows how they pitch in to protect the environment, while encouraging others to do the same.

Through those posters and in the lessons they learn while making them, students can be introduced to a number of tips on how they can help the environment, including:

- Reducing paper use;
- Conserving water;
- Using reusable containers;
- Planting trees;
- Recycling old clothes; and
- Turning off electronic devices when not in use

School districts across our region have already or will soon receive information on how to enter their students into this contest.
