## Griffo, AT&T and CNY Veterans Outreach center kickoff annual Cell Phones For Soldiers Collection Drive

UTICA – In honor of Veterans Day and Military Family Appreciation Month, Deputy Minority Leader Joseph Griffo, R-I-C-Rome, was joined by AT&T and the Central New York Veterans Outreach Center today to kick off the annual Cell Phones For Soldiers collection drive.

For every donated phone valued at \$5, Cell Phones For Soldiers is able to provide 2 ½ hours of free talk time to deployed troops via calling cards. All proceeds from the recycled devices will be used to buy long distance calling cards for troops at home and abroad. As many as 200,000 troops are serving in the U.S. military around the world and by donating to Cell Phones For Soldiers, local residents and businesses can provide a valuable lifeline for America's bravest men and women to connect with loved ones back home.

The collection drive starts today and runs through Sunday, Dec. 9. The public and businesses can drop off gently used and unwanted cell phones and/or tablets at collection bins in AT&T stores throughout the region and at several public locations throughout the senator's district. This is the fifth year that the drive has taken place. Residents throughout Deputy Minority Leader Griffo's district have donated approximately 3805 devices and have provided troops with approximately 171,225 minutes over the last four years.

"The upcoming holidays are an especially hard time for our soldiers overseas to be so far away from their families, and the simple sound of a loved one's voice can go a long way to lift up their spirits," Deputy Minority Leader Griffo said. "These brave men and women have stepped up to serve our nation, and so I am proud to once again team up with AT&T, the Central New York Veterans Outreach Center and Cell Phones for Soldiers to help connect these troops to their families back home."

Cell Phones For Soldiers was founded in 2004 by teenagers Robbie and Brittany Bergquist at the ages of 12 and 13. The charity has since provided more than 300 million minutes of free talk time to servicemen and women stationed around the world through its calling card program, Minutes That Matter. Funds raised from the recycling of cellular phones are used to purchase prepaid international calling cards. On average, Cell Phones For Soldiers distributes 1,500 calling cards each week to bases around the world, care package programs, deployment ceremonies and VA hospitals. Since 2004, Cell Phones For Soldiers has provided U.S. troops with more than 300 million “Minutes That Matter” and distributed more than 5 million prepaid international calling cards and have recycled more than 15 million mobile devices, reducing the impact on landfills. Approximately half of the phones processed are reconditioned and reused, while the those that can’t be are dismantled for to reclaim materials and the funds raised from this process are used to purchase calling cards.

“For more than a century, AT&T has been dedicated to supporting our veterans, active military personnel and their families through various company initiatives,” AT&T New York President Amy Kramer said. “We are honored to collaborate with Deputy Minority Leader Griffo, Central New York Veterans Outreach Center and Cell Phones For Soldiers again this year to encourage the Mohawk Valley and North Country community to join us and donate their used mobile devices and tablets to help the brave men and women who are deployed to protect and serve our country stay connected to their friends, family and loved ones at home, especially during the holiday season.”

“I would like to thank Deputy Minority Leader Griffo and AT&T for once again spearheading this important and worthy initiative, Vincent Scalise, Central New York Veterans Outreach Center executive director, said. “This annual collection drive has helped many men and women serving in our military connect with their families and loved ones during the holidays and throughout the year. - Remove your phone's SIM card Erase your address book, photos, messages and other stored information.
- Restore the device factory settings on your device.
- For instructions on how to do this, go to owner's manual or to the manufacturers' web site.
