

Senate Republican Leader Rob Ortt Scores 100 Percent on NFIB Legislative Scorecard

ALBANY, NY – Senate Republican Leader Rob Ortt was recognized today as having scored 100 percent on the voting scorecard from the 2021-22 legislative session by the National Federation of Independent Businesses (NFIB), the state and nation's leading small business advocacy association.

NFIB's annual legislative scorecard tracked lawmakers' votes on several key issues affecting small businesses that came before the Legislature, including tax relief, economic recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic and the restoration of the state's Unemployment Insurance fund. On each of these issues, Senator Ortt consistently voted to support the best interests of the small business community.
