WHEREAS, Queen Ifrica first made a name for herself in 1995, while performing at a talent contest at Club Inferno; three years later, she had a meeting with producer Patrick "Tony Rebel" Barrett, who helped her get into the music business through Flames Productions; and

WHEREAS, Queen Ifrica has appeared in numerous music festivals, and signed a record deal with VP Records, leading to the release of her first album, Montego Bay, in July of 2009; her second album, Climb, was released in March of 2017, and topped the Billboard Reggae Albums chart; and

WHEREAS, This award recipient exemplifies the best of her community, by virtue of her energy, vision, and dedication, commanding the greatest

respect among her friends and colleagues, and within the community at large; and

WHEREAS, It is the custom of this Legislative Body to commend

individuals of outstanding character, who have shown initiative and commitment toward constantly pursuing higher goals for themselves, and acting as role models of leadership to be emulated by both peers and young people; now, therefore, be it
