Senate OKs anti-bullying legislation

ALBANY | A bill that addresses bullying in New York state schools passed the state Senate Thursday.

"Too many young lives are destroyed by bullying and the Legislature should stay as vigilant as possible to secure O'MARA schools as safe harbors for every student. If there's a way to help stop it, we should try," said Sen. Tom O'Mara, R-Big Flats, who sponsored the bill. The bill (S.4921) would,

among other things:

■ Require school districts to include methods for discouraging acts of bullying and cyber-bullying within the required instruction in civility, citizenship, and character education;

■ Define bullying and cyber-bullying and add these acts to the list of

incidents for which disciplinary measures must be taken pursuant to the school district's code of

> ■ Require all school employees to report incidents of bullying and cyber-bulling;

■ Enhance the state's school training requirements to include bullying prevention.

O'Mara said that comprehensive anti-bullying legislation has been introduced in the Senate over the past few years in the wake of a series of tragic bullying incidents in New York, Massachu-setts, and elsewhere across the nation.

Statistics show that efforts are working in states where bullying prevention is taught in

The bill now goes to the Assembly.

Howard, Odessa Projects to get state aid

ALBANY | A pair of local renewable energy projects will receive part of \$191 million from New York state.

The Howard wind farm and the anaerobic digestion project at Bergen Farms in Odessa are among 17 projects that will receive funds from the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority and the Public Service



NYSERDA officials said these 17 projects will produce nearly \$500 million in economic benefits over the next 20 years. The projects will be funded through the state's Renewable Portfolio Standard, which was tasked with obtaining at least 30 percent of the state's electricity from renewable sources by 2015.

It's estimated the projects will produce about 1 million megawatt-hours of clean, renewable energy per year.

For New York to lead the way in innovation and technology, we must provide the resources and support necessary to enhance clean energy projects today," Gov. Andrew Cuomo said. "New York has one of the most ambitious and responsible renewable energy targets in the nation."

RATHBONE | A Rathbone man wanted on several charges was arrested Wednesday after a brief foot chase with police.


