Murat Akaydin

Murat Akaydin served in the United States Army and achieved the rank of E-4 Specialist.

Growing up in Coney Island, Brooklyn, Mr. Akaydin learned two very important things from his mother: the importance of education and the value of helping others. Over the next few decades, he exemplified both lessons — earning prestigious degrees and serving his country in diverse roles. While his sense of community has expanded, and the nature of his work has shifted, Mr. Akaydin has continued to fight for equality and local democracy.

Mr. Akaydin came of age at a pivotal time in New York's history, as terrorists toppled the World Trade Center and America's military entered two foreign wars. As a high schooler in the early 2000s, he founded a club to dispel misconceptions about Islam and led efforts to combat violence in his community. Seeking to make money for his family, serve his City, and gain access to an affordable higher education, Mr. Akaydin enlisted in the military. He was placed with the 101 Airborne Division and was deployed to Afghanistan Regional Command East, where he worked in military intelligence from 2010 to 2011.

After earning his bachelor's degree from American Military University and his Master of Public Administration from CUNY John Jay, Mr. Akaydin served as a NYC Civic Innovation Fellow. In that role, he helped community boards across the City utilize New York's Open Data to study community demographics and achieve equitable representation in community board appointments.

Currently, Mr. Akaydin works for the NYC Campaign Finance Board, advancing voter education efforts, such as the publication of NYC Voter Guides. This year, he was selected to join Community Board 7 on the Upper West Side. He also serves as the Chair of Generation Vote's Education Fund and Vice President of Muslim Americans in Public Service NY, among many other roles. He is a proud and active member of his union, DC37 Local 1549.

His military service is only part of his already long public life, yet it continues to guide his values as he works to deepen his community roots, empower neighbors, and improve local government.

LASHAUN BENJAMIN, SR.

LaShaun Benjamin, Sr. served in the United States Marine Corps and achieved the rank of First Sergeant, E-8.

Mr. Benjamin retired after 20 years of service from the Fourth Light Armored Reconnaissance Battalion. His tours of duty and deployments included Operation Enduring Freedom Afghanistan and Operation Iraqi Freedom.

After his tenure with the military, Mr. Benjamin immediately began giving back to his community. He began a co-teaching position in Leadership Education as a Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (JROTC) Instructor at Mexico Academy and Central School District in Upstate New York. This is a unique program sponsored by the Marine Corps that authorizes retired veterans to assist in educating our youth to become better citizens.

Mr. Benjamin utilizes lessons learned from the Marine Corps to inspire and encourage growth in others. He has an exceptional work ethic, dedication, and willingness to serve his community.

He strives to be a leader who is approachable and easy to talk with. Mr. Benjamin is passionate in all he does and has been observed discussing career options with his cadets and the youth who attend Tillie's Touch.

In addition to his professional accomplishments, Mr. Benjamin is a person of incomparable integrity and character. He prioritizes honesty, respect, and kindness in all interactions and is committed to creating a positive and inclusive community. During his free time, he volunteers at his local church, The Promise Land Church in East Syracuse. His dependability and exceptional care for anything he does makes him a standout member of our community.

Mr. Benjamin is married to Tasha Benjamin, a Lead Advocate at the McMahon Ryan Child Advocacy Center. They met while he was in the Marine Security Guard program in London, England. They are the proud parents of four exceptional children, LaShae, Tiesha, LaShaun Jr., and Naomi.

Justin Berbig

Justin Berbig served in the United States Army in the 82nd Airbourne Division from 2001-2005 as a land combat electronic missiles repairman in Afghanistan. He achieved the rank of Specialist.

During his service to our Nation, he earned numerous awards and commendations, including two Army Commendation Medals, the Army Achievement Medal, the National Defense Medal, the Afghanistan Campaign Medal, the Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, Army Service Ribbon, and Parachutist Badge.

Mr. Berbig received his degree in History from the State University of New York at New Paltz, where he was the president, founder, and coach of the New Paltz Croquet Club. He continues to volunteer his time every year at the National Collegiate Croquet Championships, where he assists and mentors other croquet players. For his effort and dedication, he was named as one of New Paltz's 40 Under 40 recipients.

Mr. Berbig is steadfast in his efforts to serve other veterans in the community. At Island Harvest, he coordinated Operation Hope, where he was charged with scheduling and delivering food and supplies to hundreds of veterans across Long Island.

Always going above and beyond what is expected of him in his various roles, Mr. Berbig ensures that veterans and their families connect with much needed benefits and are aware of available resources. He also enjoys sharing his love of gardening.

He currently works at Long Island Cares as Veteran Outreach Coordinator, where he advocates for the needs of veterans and connects them with essential services

A resident of North Babylon, Mr. Berbig and his wife, Selena, are the proud parents of two children, Zoey and Brandon.

CLAYTON W. BIHL

Clayton W. Bihl served in the United States Army from 1943 to 1946 and achieved the rank of First Sergeant.

Mr. Bihl was born and raised in Buffalo, New York. He attended grade school at St. Mark's, where he was a Boy Scout and an altar boy. He participated in numerous sports and enjoyed singing in the chorus. His schooling continued at Bennett High School.

In 1943, when Mr. Bihl was 19, he was drafted into the Army. He was assigned to the Anti-Aircraft unit at Camp Davis in North Carolina. He truly wanted to be a pilot and completed the pilot training exam. After a temporary assignment at Kessler Field in Biloxi, Mississippi, he was transferred to Texas Southwestern State College, where he studied Navigation and Pilot Training.

It was during this time that he received word that he had to forgo his studies and training, and he was being transferred to the infantry and sent overseas to fight the Germans. He landed in Marseille, France and was assigned to the 103rd Division. Mr. Bihl was quickly promoted to First Sergeant.

After fighting battles in the Vosges Mountains, his Division continued to push through, and in December 1944, Mr. Bihl fought in the Battle of the Bulge, where he spent 26 days living in a foxhole. Later, the 103rd Division moved deeper into enemy territory and broke through a series of defensive barricades called the Siegfried Line, located on the western border of Germany. Once inside Germany, Mr. Bihl took part in liberating the prisoners held at the Kaufering Concentration Camp, which was a sub-camp of the Dachau.

On April 28, 1946, Mr. Bihl was honorably discharged and received five medals for his bravery and valor during his military service.

Once back in Buffalo, he met and married Dorothea Utz. He obtained his bachelor's and master's degrees at Canisius College and became a math teacher at his alma mater, Bennett High School.

Now retired from teaching, Mr. Bihl and his wife spend time traveling and gathering with friends and family at their lake cottage. Mr. Bihl was also a volunteer at a local nursing home.

Along with his three children, Mr. Bihl has six grandchildren and four great-grandchildren. He recently celebrated his 100th birthday.

Stephen C. Biscotti

Stephen C. Biscotti served in the United States Navy as a Hospital Corpsman from 1979 to 1983, followed by Active Reserve Duty from 1983 to 1985.

Mr. Biscotti is the embodiment of unselfish service to his country, his faith, and his fellow man.

He served for 21 years in the New York Police Department, retiring as Detective from the Counter-Terrorism Division.

Since 2006, Mr. Biscotti has worked in healthcare and was appointed Director of Security at Mount Sinai South Nassau (MSSN) in November 2016.

Mr. Biscotti was instrumental in starting the Mount Sinai South Nassau Veterans Committee in 2019, which includes members from all hospital departments. Under his leadership, the Mount Sinai South Nassau Veterans Committee holds a greatly expanded hospital Veterans Day event to honor and recognize not only the employees who are veterans, but all veterans of the United States.

A tireless and proactive champion for veterans, Mr. Biscotti has initiated and supported numerous programs in support of veterans, including the placement of a military chest for collecting food at the hospital. Since its inception, over 4,000 pounds of non-perishable food have been collected for the Nassau County Veterans Agency.

Steadfast in his pursuit to help veterans, Mr. Biscotti also assisted with the "Suits on Soldiers" drive to collect professional clothing for veterans to use in job interviews and the "Coats on Soldiers" drive to provide warm clothing for veterans and their families. He was also at the forefront in the establishment of a Veterans Committee Scholarship Fund for MSSN veterans to further their professional education.

Mr. Biscotti was the recipient of the Nassau County "Distinguished Service to Veterans Award" in 2021 and was recognized with a Citation of Commendation by the Nassau County Executive.

Mr. Biscotti's courage, bravery, and dedication to protecting our freedom and giving back to others is truly remarkable. His commitment to our Nation and selflessness are an inspiration to us all.

FLOYD SANFORD BONDS, JR.

Floyd Sanford Bonds, Jr. served in the United States Naval Reserve and the United States Army as a Private First Class.

Mr. Bonds was born in Buffalo, New York on December 23, 1929. He answered the call to serve his country following graduation from high school on October 7, 1948.

Mr. Bonds was assigned to the 450th Anti-Aircraft Artillery Battalion, Battery B. During his military service, Mr. Bonds received extensive training, attended Quartermaster School in Lee, Virginia in 1949, and returned to duty as a Utility Repairman. In 1950, he attended Fort Ord in California, completing the Clerks General Course and returning as a General Clerk

In 1951, Mr. Bonds was called to Fort Bliss, Texas to attend the Artillery School to study Fire Control Electrician courses in order to become a Fire Control Specialist, Aircraft Artillery/Automatic Weapons (AA/AW). He was last stationed at Ladd Army Base and Eielson Air Force Base in Alaska. Mr. Bonds was honorably discharged on July 16, 1952.

Upon discharge from the Army, Mr. Bonds continued his service to our community by joining the American Veterans (AMVETS), where he was an active member and held numerous leadership positions throughout his lifetime, including Post and County Commander and New York State Commander from 1995 to 1996.

Mr. Bonds was the first African American AMVETS New York State Department Commander. He was a member of the Masonic Order Paramount Lodge #73, Bison Consistory #29 and Hadji Temple #61, where he served as Past Potentate and Treasurer. Additionally, Mr. Bonds dedicated more than 37 years to working for the USPS, and he served in various roles within the Community Action Organization and the Erie County Council of Head Start.

Before his passing on October 23, 2022, Mr. Bonds worked diligently to support and honor his fellow veterans, serving as a member of the Korean War Monument Committee and the Erie County Veterans' Committee at the Erie County Fair.

Mr. Bonds was a man of faith, active in his church and within his community. He loved to travel, visiting 49 states throughout his lifetime. He is survived by his son, Floyd S. Bonds III, and daughter, Kathleen D. Bonds Walker, seven grandchildren, and nine great-grandchildren, who honor his legacy every day.

RICHARD L. BUTTERFIELD

Richard L. Butterfield proudly served his country as a member of the United States Army from 1963 to 1970.

Commissioned as Second Lieutenant upon graduation from Officer Candidate School at Ft. Benning, Georgia in March 1965, Mr. Butterfield was sent to Vietnam as a Pathfinder Team Leader, 11th Pathfinders 1st Cavalry Division.

Mr. Butterfield saw combat in the battles at LZ X-Ray, LZ Columbus and LZ Albany – la Drang Valley, where he and his team directed helicopter resupply, medical evacuation, and rescue missions. It was here that he was wounded and did not leave his team until all other wounded soldiers were removed from the battlefield.


Serving his second tour in Vietnam in 1968, Mr. Butterfield was Captain and Company Commander of E Company 2nd Battalion 506 Infantry 101st Airborne. His company conducted numerous combat operations. After recovering from injuries at Camp Zama in Japan, he returned to Vietnam and served as Team Commander with the 5th Special Forces Group (Airborne) Green Berets assigned to MACV-SOG. Missions from this unit were deemed classified.

For his valor and service to our Nation, Mr. Butterfield earned 28 personal awards and decorations, including the Purple Heart. He was inducted into the United States Army Officer Candidate School Hall of Fame in 1995.

Honorably discharged from active duty, he then served with the New York Army National Guard from 1970 to 1995 as a company commander, Battalion Commander 2nd of the 105th Infantry, and as the Commander of the 1st Brigade 42nd Infantry Division. He was breveted to the rank of Brigadier General upon his retirement in 1995.

As a civilian, Mr. Butterfield spent 35 years with the New York State Police, serving from 1970 to 2006. He moved into undercover work as an investigator with CNET and the BCI. His undercover initiatives were essential to numerous investigations, arrests, and convictions in many areas of criminal activity.

After retiring from the New York State Police, Mr. Butterfield joined the Warren County Sheriff's Office as Marine Patrol on Lake George. He was then cross-designated to go back undercover to work on a task force with the New York State Police CNET, where he again received numerous commendations for his undercover work.

EDWIN CARTOSKI

Edwin Cartoski served his country for decades, retiring from the United States Marine Corps in 1974 with the rank of Colonel.

Mr. Cartoski grew up in Quiogue and graduated high school early to enlist in the United States Navy, where he had extensive flight training in the V-5 pilots training program.

He reported to Colgate University for civilian pilot accelerated training. He then went to UNC at Chapel Hill for a higher level of physical training and to learn code, aeronautical terms, advanced identification of enemy aircraft, and tactics. He received additional flight training at E Base in St. Louis, Missouri. The final stage of training took place in Pensacola Naval Air Station, where he was commissioned as a 2nd Lt. Marine Pilot

Mr. Cartoski was sent to the Philippines and then Hawaii, where his squadron supported the Bikini Bomb test. Mr. Cartoski stated, "We had F6F drones that flew into the cloud to read the radiation and collect other data. Our ship was a support ship. We retrieved a Hell Cat that was irradiated. It was isolated, but a lot of guys were in bad shape by the time we got back to Pearl Harbor."

In 1946, Mr. Cartoski left the military and enrolled at the University of Alabama to study aeronautical engineering, but was recalled to active duty and served with the Marines in Korea, where he provided air support for the First Marine Division. The Marine Corps sent him to Pensacola to be a Flight Trainer, then reassigned him to Marine Corps Base Camp Lejeune in North Carolina.

Mr. Cartoski left active duty in 1955 and remained in the Marine Reserve and worked for Grumman Aerospace. He also is a graduate of the Naval War College at the Marine Base at Quantico, Virginia.

During his notable career, he earned numerous awards, including: The Distinguished Flying Cross with one Gold Star, The Air Medal with five Gold Stars, Presidential Unit Citation for service in Korea, Army Distinguished Citation for service in Korea, Organized Marine Corps Reserve Medal, American Campaign Medal, Victory Medal World War II, National Defense Service Medal, Korean Service Medal, United Nations Service Medal, and Korean Presidential Unit Citation for service in Korea.

Mr. Cartoski retired from Grumman in 1983 and received the Sikorsky Helicopter Rescue Award for his skills and courage when participating in numerous lifesaving missions.

ANTHONY CATALANO

Anthony Catalano served in the United States Army and obtained the rank of Sergeant.

A World War II veteran, Mr. Catalano, along with two of his brothers, were drafted into the military in 1941. He was immediately assigned to General Patton's famed 3rd Army in the 70th Infantry Division, known as the "Trailblazers."

In 1944, his Division spent 83 consecutive days in combat, with part of that time spent fighting the infamous Battle of the Bulge in sub-freezing temperatures in Ardennes, France. "When we got to the Ardennes, we were in four feet of snow and without winter gear," Mr. Catalano recalled. "We were stuck; we couldn't move." Eventually, they ran out of water and rations, which Mr. Catalano would not eat, but exchanged with fellow soldiers for chocolate. For water, he had his men collect snow in their canteens and melt it until supplies could arrive. Eventually, bulldozers plowed through the snow to rescue them.

When Mr. Catalano's Division moved on to Belgium and Germany, vehicles were scarce, so he and his soldiers had to march miles on foot through snow and slush. "Some were getting trench foot," he said, a condition caused by prolonged exposure to cold, wet conditions. Mr. Catalano's Company was also part of the group that liberated the Dachau Concentration Camp. He is still visibly shaken by the experience and doesn't like to talk about the horrors he saw. "I was 23 and felt like an old man. I think I turned gray at 25" he added.

When the war in Europe ended, he served four more years in the United States Group Control Council in Berlin, helping U.S. forces set up a German military government to restore order.

Once home, he worked for the Federal Aviation Administration as an Air Traffic Controller at LaGuardia Airport and at Idlewild Airport, now known as John F. Kennedy Airport. He retired in 1973 as Assistant Chief Controller.

Over the years, Mr. Catalano shared his experiences with students in local schools. He is still an active member of VFW Post 5253 in Albertson.

A resident of Mineola, Mr. Catalano turned 103 years old on October 23. He is predeceased by his wife, Linda, who passed in 2009.

JOSEPH M. CETTA

Joseph M. Cetta's military career spanned nearly four decades (Active and Reserve) with both the United States Marine Corps and the New York Army National Guard. He achieved the rank of Lieutenant Colonel.

Born in Walton, New York, Mr. Cetta knew at an early age that he wanted to serve his country, and he enlisted with the U.S. Marine Corps Delayed Entry Program after his junior year at Walton High School. Just five days after graduation, he arrived at Parris Island to begin his training. He then spent four years on active duty with VFMA-312 with two Western Pacific deployments that included duty in Japan, the Philippines, Okinawa, South Korea, Guam, and Wake Island. He was honorably discharged in June 1983.

Two months later, Mr. Cetta joined the New York Army National Guard. Over the next 32 years, he held numerous leadership positions and was deployed to missions throughout New York State in response to natural disasters. Additional deployments took Mr. Cetta to Panama, Honduras, and Guatemala on nation-building missions.

Later, he was ordered to active duty and deployed to both Iraq and Afghanistan, serving as Liaison Officer with the 42nd Infantry Division during each tour.

The highly decorated veteran has received the Marine Corps Good Conduct Medal, Meritorious Service Medal, Sea Service Deployment Ribbon, Army Reserve Components Achievement Medal, Armed Forces Reserve Medal, National Defense Service Medal, Humanitarian Service Medal, Army Service Ribbon, Army Reserve Components Overseas Training Ribbon, Joint Meritorious Unit Award, Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, Iraq Campaign Medal, and Afghanistan Campaign Medal.

He continues to give back to the community where he grew up. Mr. Cetta first served as Village Trustee in his hometown of Walton, and now as the Town Supervisor. He is also a firefighter with the Walton Fire Department.

Mr. Cetta has demonstrated an unwavering commitment to his country, his fellow service members, and his community. His contributions, both in and out of uniform, are well deserving of our eternal respect and admiration.

KATHY DEAN

Kathy Dean served in the United States Army and achieved the rank of Sergeant.

Ms. Dean proudly served our Nation as an active-duty soldier serving two stints of Army service. A skilled military member, she trained at Ft. McClellan, Alabama, Charlies Company Cobras, Second Platoon, Training Battalion and Ft. Still, Oklahoma, C Battery, First Battalion 19th Field Artillery 1st Platoon Night Stalkers.

Ms. Dean's first period of regular Army Active-Duty Service and Military Occupational Specialty (MOS) was as a 02J20 Clarinet Player from 1980 to 1986. She went on to Advance Individual Training at the School of Music, Naval Amphibious Base, in Little Creek, Virginia, where she was stationed for six months.

Her permanent duty stations were 1st Army Band in Ft. Meade, Maryland; the 8th Army Band in Seoul, Korea; and the 19th Army Band in Ft. Dix, New Jersey.

Ms. Dean's second Regular Army Period was from 1999 to 2002. Her Military Occupational Speciality was as a 75H20 Personnel Sergeant (S1) at Ft. Huachuca, Arizona. She was assigned to the 38th Personnel Service Battalion in Bamberg, Germany.

A Global War on Terrorism veteran (GWOT), Ms. Dean was mobilized at Ft. Huachuca, Arizona on a Post Quick Reaction Force the day the Twin Towers fell in New York City, when our Nation was attacked on the horrific day of September 11, 2001.

The Department of Defense sent out a THREATCON DELTA order, and soldiers were to separate barracks at Ft. Huachuca, sleeping in full uniform with field gear right beside their bunks. Working 12-hour shifts, the Army Judge Advocate General's Corps (JAG) read the Rule of Engagement before every shift. The soldiers were then marched down to the Arms Room in order to be issued M-16s from the Supply Sergeant, who would also distribute four magazines of live ammunition.

In the aftermath of 9/11, Ms. Dean, along with many others, began to be mobilized to different parts of the military post they were assigned to. They were locked and loaded as they were under the threat of being bombed. Ms. Dean also assisted the Military Police with Post Check Points.

Even though she was in dangerous situations and uncertainty, Ms. Dean performed her duties with honor and vigilance.

Melissa del Valle-Ortiz served in the United States Army as a Unit Supply Specialist.

Ms. del Valle-Ortiz was born and raised in Brooklyn, New York. After her honorable discharge, she returned home to where she now resides in Sunset Park. She is a proud mother of two, Jeffrey and Victoria. Ms. del Valle-Ortiz served on the PTA throughout their education until they graduated from high school.


Ms. del Valle-Ortiz has been employed in Sunset Park's nonprofit and government sectors since 1994. He shared his passion for wrestling with young people for decades as a volunteer coach at the Westside YMCA, which recognized him as a "Volunteer of the Year." He has also been an active supporter of Theatre for the New City, where he's volunteered in many capacities.

Mr. Delorenzo lives on Roosevelt Island with his amazing wife, Farisha.

Joshua Jose Diaz served in the United States Army from 2011 to 2019 and obtained the rank of Specialist. He served active duty at the Joint Special Operations Command and was involved in Operation Enduring Freedom.

HERBERT J. DUNMORE, JR.

Herbert J. Dunmore, Jr. served in the United States Army and achieved the rank of Sergeant E-5.

Mr. Dunmore's assignments included Vietnam from 1966 to 1968 after being drafted at 19 years of age. At the time, he was attending night school.

His units of service included Battalion, 2nd Infantry Regiment, 1st Infantry Division. Mr. Dunmore's tours of duty included Fort Hamilton, New York; Fort Ord, California; Fort Polk, Louisiana; Fort Riley, Kansas; and Vietnam.


Six months after being drafted, Mr. Dunmore was engaged in combat in Vietnam. His patrol group was walking when an enemy mine exploded under them in 1966. Shrapnel cut through his face, elbow, and leg. Mr. Dunmore spent seven weeks in the hospital and was awarded a Purple Heart, an honor given to military members wounded or killed while serving.

Upon returning home, Mr. Dunmore became an instructor to special education students in the basics of math, science and reading. He helped develop lesson plans and behavioral and academic improvement plans to ensure timely graduation from middle school and high school. He is also a retired Technology Sales Executive.

Currently, Mr. Dunmore is actively involved with the community to create a monument that commemorates the contributions of current military members and veterans of color from Syracuse. The monument is planned for Kirk Park on the City's South Side, located in the historical Black districts in Syracuse.

Mr. Dunmore is the Post Commander for American Legion Dunbar Post 1642 – one of the oldest all-Black veterans' legions in the country. The Dunbar Post began in 1947 as a social space for Black veterans in Syracuse.

Born in Harlem, he relocated to Syracuse in 1976 and married his wife, Linda. He is proud of their two sons, Herbert Jay and Vernon, and has seven grandchildren.

CHESTER EDWARDS

Chester Edwards served in the United States Navy from 1966 to 1972 and obtained the rank of E-3 Engineman/Fireman. In 2003, he enlisted in the New York State Guard and retired with the rank of Colonel in 2018.

While in the Navy, his tour included combat duty in Vietnam as an Assault Support Patrol Boat Coxswain with the Mobile Riverine Force from 1968 to 1969. He earned numerous recognitions including two Navy Achievement Medals with Combat "V," Combat Action Ribbon, and two Presidential Unit Citations.

Currently, Mr. Edwards is Executive Director of the Westchester County Veterans Alliance, Inc., board member of both Hudson Valley Honor Flight and ProVetus, Inc., and Peer Mentor & Mentor Coordinator for the Veterans Treatment Track of the Middletown City Court. He serves as a member of the Board of Visitors of the NYS Veterans Home at Montrose. Since 2022, he has been a keynote speaker at veterans events, where he shares the personal story of his time serving in Vietnam.

Peter Fiumefreddo served as a Private First Class in the United States Army.

Mr. Fiumefreddo, of Hawthorne, was born in East Harlem, New York, and raised in the Bronx. After being drafted into the Army in 1963, he was stationed at Camp Smith as a soldier in the 8th Division, 1st Battalion 87th Infantry Heavy Weapons Platoon. During the Berlin Crisis, his unit deployed to Baumholder, Germany, where he was a Gunner on the 81mm mortar and 106 recoilless rifle. In April 1965, he received orders to return to Fort Hamilton in Brooklyn, where he was honorably discharged.

Mr. Fiumefreddo has 30 years of experience working for non-profit organizations focused on veterans affairs and community outreach. He is the Founder and Chairman of the New York State Medal of Honor Committee. He was instrumental in the installation of the Medal of Honor monument on the grounds of Mount Pleasant's Town Hall, as well as organizing parades honoring Medal of Honor recipients. He currently serves as the Commander of Hawthorne Post 112, American Legion, and has been an active board member of the Selective Service Draft Board for the past 16 years.

Previously, Mr. Fiumefreddo worked for the U.S. Census Bureau as a Partnership Specialist and Team Leader, developing outreach plans to maximize veterans' participation in the 2000 and 2010 censuses. He served as the chairman of the Grand Marshals for the Columbus Day Parade on 5th Avenue for more than 25 years, and he also served on the housing and zoning committee of Bronx Community Board 10. Joseph A. Gentiluomo

Joseph A. Gentiluomo, age 101, of Schenectady, New York was a Staff Sergeant in the United States Army. He served in combat in the Pacific Theater during World War II as part of the "Greatest Generation" of Americans who saved our world from tyranny.

Mr. Gentiluomo served in the Army from 1942 to 1946 under the 59th Service Group. After basic training, Mr. Gentiluomo attended the National School of Aeronautics in Kansas City. He was later assigned to the machine shops at various airfields in Santa Maria, Sacramento, San Bernadino, and the Mojave Desert in California.

While stationed in the Pacific, Mr. Gentiluomo serviced B-24 Liberator bombers on Angaur Island in the Palau Islands, and later Okinawa. Mr. Gentiluomo's technical expertise, as part of the team that helped repair and maintain American aircraft, helped keep his fellow service members safe during military campaigns in the Philippines, Ryukyus, and the Western Pacific. He was a critical part of the overall war effort that contributed to victory in the Pacific against Imperial Japan. Mr. Gentiluomo's unit was later sent to Seoul, South Korea for post-war occupation duty.

For his service and valor, Mr. Gentiluomo received numerous commendations and awards, including the American Service Medal, Good Conduct Medal, the Asiatic-Pacific Service Medal, and World War II Victory Medal.

After World War II ended, Mr. Gentiluomo returned home, graduated from RPI, and worked for GE and IBM. He holds 28 patents including for different golf balls and a mechanical hand that was used by NASA.

Most notably, Mr. Gentiluomo is the inventor of the modern bowling ball. Mr. Gentiluomo's bowling ball patent puts all the weight on the inside of the bowling ball, giving bowlers more power to knock the pins down.

Mr. Gentiluomo was married to the late Orega Gentiluomo for 67 years. They have two children, three grandchildren, and three great-grandchildren.

RYAN GRAHAM

Ryan Graham served in the United States Air Force and achieved the rank of Senior Airman/E-4.

An Air Force and Iraq War veteran from Queens, New York, Mr. Graham enlisted after the horrific 9/11 terror attacks on our Nation. Mr. Graham's military service spanned six years, from the 52nd Fighter Wing in Germany, working within the A4 directorate of the Air Force Special Operations Command headquarters at Hurlburt Field, Florida, to the Logistics Support Center under Air Combat Command headquarters at Langley AFB, Virginia. He was also deployed in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom to Camp Sather, Baghdad International Airport.

Since returning home, Mr. Graham has been active in the veteran community and the VFW. In addition, he serves on the Board of Directors of the ARC Foundation (and as treasurer) and is Co-Chair of the Lowville Cream Cheese Festival.



CHRISTOPHER HOLSHEK

Christopher Holshek served in the United States Army and achieved the rank of Colonel.

Mr. Holshek is an international peace and security consultant and civil-military director at Narrative Strategies. In his 30 years as a U.S. Army Civil Affairs officer, his assignments included: command of the first Civil Affairs battalion deployed to Iraq; Chief of Civil-Military Coordination for the UN Mission in Liberia; and European Command Military Representative at the U.S. Agency for International Development. He continues to serve as Vice President of the Civil Affairs Association.

He has been a senior civil-military advisor for the NATO "Resilient Civilians in Hybrid and Population-Centric Warfare" and Grey Zone projects. For his services then and since, the U.S. Army Special Operations Command inducted him as a Distinguished Member of the Civil Affairs Regiment in 2017.

Marie Carmel Houanche served in the United States Army. A commissioned officer, she was Second Lieutenant and Assistant Chaplain.

Ms. Houanche was a member of the 8th Medical Brigade, Army Nurse Corps. She was assigned to the 344th Combat Support Hospital. Her primary MOS was 66H, secondary 66C treachery 66J. The unit was activated and deployed to Desert Storm, Iraq and Afghanistan.

Faith has guided Ms. Houanche throughout her life and career, resulting in her becoming an ordained pastor. Born in Haiti, she grew up in Paris and eventually immigrated to the United States. Ms. Houanche always had a penchant for learning and attended the Borough of Manhattan Community College, earning an Associate Degree in Nursing, followed by a Bachelor's Degree from Medgar Evers College. RICHIE JARCHO

Richie Jarcho served as a Private First Class in the United States Army.

A man with a deep sense of duty and compassion, Mr. Jarcho embarked on his military journey by proactively moving up in the draft to serve his country. In 1958, he underwent basic training at Fort Dix before being stationed as a cook at Fort Benning, Georgia. However, destiny had other plans, as he was deployed to Korea on General Mann's troop ship alongside 5,000 others. Assigned to a signal outfit, Mr. Jarcho's adaptability and quick learning led him to take care of generators despite having no prior experience.


Upon returning home, Mr. Jarcho's commitment to service remained undiminished. When President Kennedy recalled troops due to the Berlin Crisis, he willingly rejoined and served at Fort Eustis, Virginia until his honorable discharge in 1961. Following his military career, he began selling marble and glass tables for his cousin.

Mr. Jarcho's journey of charity began approximately 23 years ago, triggered by a heart-rending story about a disabled veteran who lost his limbs in the war. His compassion and determination drove him to help veterans in need. Despite initial challenges, Mr. Jarcho persisted and established a tradition of distributing turkeys during major holidays, including Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Easter. His efforts continued to grow, and he reached out to various organizations to expand his impact.

Recognizing the potential of equine therapy for veterans with PTSD, Mr. Jarcho adopted horses and partnered with sponsors to regularly provide life-changing treatment to veterans.

For his dedication and staunch support of veterans and their families, he has received numerous awards and recognitions.

Mr. Jarcho's life has been a testament to the power of volunteerism, empathy, and generosity. From his military service to his communal endeavors, he has left an indelible mark on the lives of veterans and the Rockland community, showing that a single individual's compassion can bring about profound positive change.

WILLIAM R. JOYCE

William R. Joyce began his military service in 1972, when he was drafted into the United States Army. As a Specialist Fourth Class, he was stationed in Germany, guarding the eastern border with Czechoslovakia.

When his tour ended in 1975, Mr. Joyce returned home and began a 40-year civilian career with the New York State Police. He resumed his military service by enlisting in the Army Reserve, eventually rising through the ranks to become a Command Sergeant Major.

Since becoming Genesee County's Veterans Services Director more than a decade ago, Mr. Joyce has become known for going above and beyond to help veterans secure the benefits they have earned. Such dedication comes from his four decades of military service and an understanding of the sacrifices involved.

At Peterson Air Force Base, as General Eberhart's senior enlisted advisor, he developed a ceremony recognizing the inactivation of SPACECOM and the activation of U.S. Northern Command (NORTHCOM). His work on the historic event, attended by General Shelton and Defense Secretary Rumsfeld, earned him Challenge Coins for achieving a "joint ceremony like no other."

In 2012, Mr. Joyce retired from the military after 40 years of distinguished service, which included deployments to Bosnia, Iraq, and Afghanistan. His achievements earned him multiple medals, including the Bronze Star. To this day, he is grateful to his family for their support during his extended absences.

As the Director of the County's Veterans Service Agency, Mr. Joyce has established the agency as a leader in the number of claims submitted on behalf of veterans for health care, education and other benefits.

He initiated rural outreach within and beyond his service area to help homebound veterans. He has assisted veterans as far away as the Philippines, and he takes satisfaction in having secured a 100 percent disability rating for two terminally ill veterans in record time, providing them with peace of mind that their spouses would receive survivor benefits.

Mr. Joyce continues to be active in many veterans' organizations and serves as the President of the Western New York National Cemetery Memorial Council.

HOWARD KALACHMAN

Howard Kalachman served in the United States Army and achieved the rank of Specialist E-5. He is a Vietnam combat veteran and Bronze Star recipient who has dedicated his life to advancing the needs of veterans.

Mr. Kalachman's was among the first names to appear on the Nassau County Vietnam Veterans Wall in Eisenhower Park and the Long Beach Veterans Walk of Honor. He is a lifetime member of American Legion Post 972 and the Vice Commander and Finance Officer of Legion Post 335. He has served on the Nassau County United Veterans Organization and the Nassau County Veterans Advisory Board since 2017.

Mr. Kalachman is the author of the memoir "Hi Mom, I'm O.K.": and Other Lies From Vietnam, which he describes as, "...not so much a story of heroes in the usual sense, but a reminder of and dedicated to the sacrifices made by veterans and their loved ones."

In 2010, he became the veterans' consultant and liaison for the NYIT and New York State "Troops to Teachers" program, which places eligible veterans in teaching positions at public schools.

Passionate about helping his fellow service men and women, Mr. Kalachman advocates for veteran suicide prevention and worked as a volunteer suicide hotline manager. Before the COVID-19 pandemic, he spent many days at the Northport V.A. Hospital, serving his less fortunate brother and sister veterans on various goodwill visits.

Mr. Kalachman attends every opportunity to meet, greet, escort, and distribute needed items to homeless veterans. He has spent countless volunteer hours over the decades raising money and volunteering for the DAV, American Legion, VFW, Long Beach Waterfront Warriors, Peaceful Minds, and Hope for the Warrior, along with other numerous organizations.

Due to his steadfast commitment and dedication on behalf of veterans, Mr. Kalachman has earned numerous awards, including the Town of Hempstead Veterans Medal and the Nassau County Distinguished Service to Veterans Medal.

In addition to being a lifelong advocate for veterans, Mr. Kalachman enjoys volunteer pursuits that serve the community at large. He strongly believes in helping his brother and sister veterans and repeatedly backs that up with his actions. When it comes to lending a helping hand, he simply does not have the word "No" in his vocabulary.

VANESSA A. LEE

Vanessa A. Lee served in the United States Air Force Reserve and retired at the rank of Technical Sergeant.

Ms. Lee joined the Reserve and became a member of the 49th and 35th Aerial Port Squadrons at McGuire Air Force Base in New Jersey, retiring in 2005. Her tours of duty include Operation Iraqi Freedom and Operation Desert Storm.

A Supervisor in the Aerial Port Passenger Service section, she was responsible for servicing military and commercial airline passengers with ticketing reservations, coordinating civilian passenger and troop airline manifests while maintaining staff schedules, training records, and writing evaluations for promotion to the next rank. Ms. Lee received credits from the Community College of the Air Force in Transportation Logistics and was certified in 2000 as a travel agent.

Ms. Lee earned a Bachelor of Arts from York College (CUNY) and joined the New York City Department of Education in 1995. She worked as a Family Worker in the Guidance Office, while studying for a Master of Science in Counselor Education.

In 1997, Ms. Lee transitioned into a Licensed Guidance Counselor position, assisting students in grades 9-12 with academic advisement, intervention services, career exploration, and college readiness. She is a certified Global Career Development Facilitator, Career Development Specialist, College Admissions Specialist, and a certified School Career Development Advisor. After 25 years of school counselor experience, she retired in 2020. She started her own non-profit organization, What's Aspiring Me, in 2021.

She is a member of numerous organizations, including the New York chapter of the National Association of Black Military Women, Vital Church NYC, American School Counselor Association, and the Association of Black Educators of New York. Ms. Lee is also a member of New York State School Counselor Association, New York State Career Development Association, National Career Development Association, and National Action Network. She also serves as a volunteer and community liaison every Tuesday at the Zion Tabernacle Church Food Pantry.

In 2017, Ms. Lee was honored during Women's History Month as a Woman of Character, Courage and Commitment. Her proudest moment is when she purchased her own home at the age of 29.

Gregory T. Lee

Gregory T. Lee served in the United States Marine Corps (USMC) and obtained the rank of Lance Corporal. He served in the Vietnam War from 1968 to 1970.

Mr. Lee enlisted in the USMC on May 2, 1968. After completing basic training, he was deployed to Vietnam. He was assigned to Co K, 3rd Marine Battalion, 7th Marine Regiment, 1st Marine Division, FMF. His division fought in search and destroy missions against enemy forces in the Quang Nam Province. During Operation Oklahoma Hills, Mr. Lee was seriously injured in a mortar explosion. He suffered multiple wounds, including to both of his legs and to his right arm, resulting in amputation.

In January 1970, Mr. Lee moved to Peru, New York and was discharged from military service on March 31, 1970. Despite this discharge, he attempted to re-enlist in the Marine Corps, stating he "could do with one arm what any man could do with two arms."


For his valor and service to our Nation, Mr. Lee earned numerous recognitions, including the National Defense Service Medal, Vietnam Service Medal with two Bronze Stars, Purple Heart Medal, Combat Action Ribbon, and the National Services Defense Medal.

Mr. Lee moved on and entered federal civilian employment at Plattsburgh Air Force Base, where he served in the Morale, Welfare and Recreation Department from 1970 to 1991. In this role, he provided direct services to veterans, including driving them to receive medical care at the VA Hospital in Albany, New York.

After retirement, Mr. Lee organized and participated in a variety of programs and services for Disabled American Veterans, Veterans of Foreign Wars, and American Legion Posts.

Since 2013, Mr. Lee has served as a volunteer for the Honor Flight in Plattsburgh. He has dedicated countless hours and energy to signing up veterans for flights, arranging sites to be visited in Washington, D.C., and organizing the welcoming and return ceremonies for the veterans.

Due to his distinguished service record and commitment to helping the fellow veterans in his community, Mr. Lee is an exemplary person and a deserving honoree for the 2023 New York State Senate Veterans Hall of Fame.

JAMES LINT

James Lint is a veteran of the United States Air Force who served in Vietnam. He obtained the rank of Staff Sergeant.

A resident of North Collins, New York, Mr. Lint was an enlisted serviceman from 1972 to 1978.

Mr. Lint is a staunch advocate in his community. He is President of the North Collins Veterans Tribute, which is located along the National Veterans Highway in North Collins. The Tribute's mission is "to have a peaceful site to recognize and honor those who served and those who continue to serve this great Nation which promotes freedom and democracy."

The Tribute consists of a 5-point star, with each point of the star designated for each branch of the United States Armed Forces: Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps and Coast Guard.

A flag of each United States military branch stands at the point of the stars. A polished granite monument in the shape of a V for victory with a pair of hands holding a bowl with an eternal flame sits in the center of the Tribute. Mr. Lint calls it a labor of love in honor of those who have given so much to our country.

Mr. Lint is an active member and former Vice President of the North Collins Senior Center and a member of the North Collins Zoning Board of Appeals. He also serves on the Schoolhouse #8 Board, which is working to restore a historic schoolhouse in North Collins. Always one to lend a helping hand, Mr. Lint also volunteers to help those from outside of his community. During the water crisis in Flint, Michigan, he answered the call for help by loading his truck with bottled water and delivering it to residents in need.

An active member of American Legion Post 1640, Mr. Lint has received numerous recognitions. In December 2020, he was honored as a Veteran of the Month by former Representative Chris Jacobs and was featured on WYRK's "Salute to Seniors," which recognizes senior citizens who have enriched the lives of those in Western New York.

Mike Liquori served in the United States Army and obtained the rank of Corporal E-4.

Mr. Liquori is retired from the Plumbers Local 1 Union and gives back to his community by remaining active in numerous groups and organizations. He is member of the Charity Masonic Lodge 727 NYC and held the position of Commander. He is the current Senior Vice Commander of Flanders Field VFW Post 150 Lion Tamer in the Corona Lion's Club. He is the Sergeant at Arms for the 110th Precinct Community Council. 

Alexander Mandara served in the United States Navy and obtained the rank of First Class Petty Officer, E-6.

Mr. Mandara was born on September 11, 1972, in the Bronx, New York and is the oldest of five siblings. He attended PS8 Elementary in Yonkers until 6th grade and PS32 for middle school.

After he graduated from Roosevelt High School at the age of 17, he decided to serve his country by joining the Navy, following in the footsteps of his grandfather, who served in the United States Army.

DAVID MANN

David Mann served in the United States Army from 1968 to 1974 and retired at the rank of Sergeant.

Most notably, Mr. Mann was a Combat Engineer in Vietnam from 1968 to 1969. In October 1968 and February 1969, he became the recipient of two Purple Hearts for missions in South Vietnam. He has also been awarded three Army Commendations with "V" devices for heroism. Along with those honors, former Governor Mario Cuomo presented him with the Conspicuous Service Medal in 1985.

Two years after graduating high school, Mr. Mann was drafted into the Army in 1968. His Basic Training was completed at Fort Jackson in South Carolina, and he finished his Advanced Individual Training at Fort Leonard Wood in Missouri. While in Vietnam, Mr. Mann served as a Machine Gunner for his company, as well as the battalion commanders. He then underwent training as an AVLB driver and an APC operator for the portable bridge deployment unit of the Army's 9th Infantry Division.

Mr. Mann dropped bridges five times for several mechanized units in the Mekong Delta. While in the Ben Tre Province, his track was demolished. This S&D mission was the reason Mr. Mann received his second Purple Heart. Several years later, he was honorably discharged in May 1974, with a rank of SGT E-5.

For 10 years, Mr. Mann has acted as the Chaplain for AL Post 269 in Patchogue, New York. He became a Life Member there this past September, and he also boasts a Life Membership with Patchogue's VFW Post-2913.

Born in Bridgeport, Connecticut on November 22, 1947, Mr. Mann commuted to and from his grandparents' residence on Long Island. In 1966, he graduated from Port Jefferson's Earl L. Vandermeulen High School. Besides his military honors, Mr. Mann is also blessed to be a father, grandfather, and great-grandfather.

Due to his military service, Mr. Mann has experienced PTSD. Additionally, his exposure to Agent Orange in South Vietnam created physical complications for his eldest daughter, Tori, who passed away at 51 years old. Despite those trials, Mr. Mann's family preserves a strong connection. Most impressively, next year will mark 50 years of being together with his beloved wife, Kathi.

PETER MARADAY

Peter Maraday served in the United States Air Force and New York Air National Guard for 24 years, retiring at the rank of Master Sergeant.

Mr. Maraday served as an Aircraft Data Systems Analyst and Database Manager within the Aircraft Maintenance Complex, first at Tyndall Air Force Base in Florida from March 1982 to April 1983, and then at Griffiss Air Force Base in New York from April 1983 to November 1985, working with F-106 and T-33 aircraft.





Born on February 14, 1947, Mr. Mooney worked at the age of 17 as an old-fashioned elevator operator for Willam A. White.





MICHAEL ORTIZ

Michael Ortiz served in the United States Army and achieved the rank of Specialist.

Mr. Ortiz's life journey has been defined by his unwavering dedication to his community and country. Born in 1962 in the Dominican Republic, he had aspired to become a police officer. However, fate had other plans for him when a friend suggested he join the Army. In August 1983, he seized the opportunity to join the Army, a decision that would change his life forever.

RALPH J. OSTERHOUDT, SR.

Ralph J. Osterhoudt, Sr. is a distinguished World War II veteran known for his lifelong dedication to his community and country.

At the age of 15, Mr. Osterhoudt joined the Ground Observer Corps, a WWII-era Civil Defense program under the United States Army Air Force. He became part of a dedicated group of local civilian volunteers entrusted to monitor the skies over the Hudson Valley, with the critical task of reporting potential enemy aircraft sightings to the Roosevelt Estate in Hyde Park, home to President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

In 1944, during his senior year at F.D.R. High School, he was drafted into the United States Army to serve his country in World War II. He deployed first to Scotland and later to France and Germany as part of the 575th Field Artillery Battalion.

Mr. Osterhoudt's courage and fortitude were exemplified in many instances, including through his heroic role as one of the first 30 liberators of Auschwitz. He and his unit played a pivotal role in the Battle of the Bulge; their mission included shelling Nazi bridges and fuel supplies as they endured relentless bombardment and traveled dangerous terrain.

For his bravery and heroism, Mr. Osterhoudt was awarded the French Medal of Honor, three Bronze Star Medals, and the Purple Heart.

After returning home to Staatsburg, Mr. Osterhoudt used his skills in electrical engineering, developed during his time in the Army, to start Osterhoudt Electric, providing a needed service in his community.

As an active member of the American Legion Post 1303, his commitment to his fellow veterans has remained steadfast. At the age of 97, he continues to participate in Memorial Day and Veterans Day events and serves as Senior Board Member for the military charity Mended Swords. Mr. Osterhoudt advocated against the closure of Castle Point VA Medical Center in Wappingers Falls, championing the preservation of vital veterans' healthcare services. His efforts to amplify veterans' stories and commemorate the fallen are a testament to his enduring patriotism.

A lifelong resident of Staatsburg, Mr. Osterhoudt exemplifies the essence of service, from his heroic contributions during WWII to his lifelong commitment to his community and fellow veterans.

KATHERINE QUINONES

Katherine Quinones served in the New York Army National Guard and achieved the rank of Staff Sergeant.

In 1996, she joined the New York Counterdrug Task Force, serving as a drug prevention specialist and Regiment Administrator for the Cadets. RICHARD REDMOND

Richard Redmond enlisted in the United States Army and achieved the rank of Major.

He courageously served his Nation for over 20 years, deploying to combat on several occasions in support of Operation Enduring Freedom in Afghanistan. He served in all duty positions, including as Rifleman in an Infantry Squad to Operations Officer and Chief of Staff of an Infantry Brigade Combat Team.

Early in his career, while stationed at Fort Bragg in North Carolina, he was selected as the 18th Airborne Corps and 82nd Airborne Division Soldier of the Year. His dedication to leadership continued as he graduated with honors and leadership recognition at all major professional development schools he attended.

During his first combat tour, Mr. Redmond heroically earned the Purple Heart after being wounded on April 28, 2008. While on patrol in Afghanistan, his vehicle was hit and completely disabled by a double-stack anti-tank mine. Immediately following, he moved to another vehicle and radioed in a close air support request while under attack. Despite having a concussion and spinal injury, Mr. Redmond continued to exercise command and control. He led his soldiers as they defended against a three-pronged attack and ultimately repelled the enemy's efforts to overrun their position. Mr. Redmond's efforts led to a successful mission.

For his valor and service, Mr. Redmond earned numerous recognitions, including the Bronze Star Medal, Meritorious Service Medal, Army Commendation Medal, Army Achievement Medal, Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, the Combat Infantryman Badge, the Expert Infantryman Badge, the Army Parachutists Badge, and the Army Air Assault Badge.

Following his retirement from the Army, Mr. Redmond made it a priority to help veterans in his community. As the Chief Operating Officer of Mohawk Valley Garden, Mr. Redmond developed the Utica Comets Hometown Hero initiative, which honors and recognizes an area veteran at every hockey game. He also spearheads the Utica Comets and the Adirondack Bank Center at Utica Memorial Auditorium's annual Veterans Day ceremony that honors and remembers the local veteran community, including all Gold Star families and Purple Heart recipients.

Mr. Redmond, and his wife, Amy, are passionate and actively involved with the Military Order of the Purple Heart Chapter 490 and the Central New York Veterans Outreach Center in Utica. Joseph Ronda is a First Sergeant in the New York Guard. He also served as a Corporal in the United States Marine Corps Reserve.

Mr. Ronda enlisted in the Reserve in 1998. Upon completion of his training, he was assigned to the 6th Communications Battalion, and in 2003, he was deployed to Kuwait for Operations Enduring Freedom and Iraqi Freedom. His base was under fire and struck by Iraqi missiles, which, years later, led him to experience PTSD. In 2004, he finished his time in the Reserve and went back to normal life.

In 2010, First Sergeant Ronda decided to enlist in the New York Guard, which augments the Army and Air National Guard and consists of civilians and prior service veterans. As a volunteer State Guardsmen, he served as an instructor and trained hundreds of civilians beginning in 2013. First Sergeant Ronda is a member of the American Legion, the Marine Corps League, and the Star Of The Sea Cadet Corps. A staunch advocate, he has performed over 700 hours of volunteer service, teaching both youth and adults about the love of God, country, patriotism, Americanism and professionalism. He works on behalf of his fellow service members and is the Master of Ceremony for the Pelham Parkway Peace Plaza Memorial Day and Veterans Day ceremonies.

ROBERT R. SPIELER

Robert R. Spieler served in the United States Army Chemical Corps as a Private.

Mr. Spieler was born on September 30, 1942 in Fort Sill, Oklahoma during World War II. He was the first and only child born to Private Alex Spieler and his wife, Irene. As the United States fought back against the Nazis' final onslaught at the great Battle of the Bulge, Private Alex Spieler, a Munitions Specialist, was deployed to the frontlines. Robert was just three years old when his father made the ultimate sacrifice in service to his country.

In 1960, our Nation was at war in Vietnam. Mr. Spieler turned 18 and began his college studies in Chemistry, having received a scholarship to Hofstra University. To honor his father's legacy, he chose to decline his survivorship exemption and join the Reserve Officers' Training Corps (ROTC). Upon his graduation in 1964, Mr. Spieler trained at Fort Dix, joined the Edgewood Arsenal, and served his country with distinction in the Chemical Corps until 1966.

Upon his return to civilian life, Mr. Spieler found lifelong fulfillment in service to his community. After a long career as a math teacher in the New York City public school system, Mr. Spieler continues to find ways to solve problems and engage people of all ages in learning new things.

Mr. Spieler founded the first chess club at the Brooklyn Public Library, which has been successful for over 10 years. Four years ago, he started Brooklyn's official Pickleball Association and successfully lobbied for the Borough's only outdoor courts at Marine Park.

At 80 years young, Mr. Spieler still trains daily, which led him to organize the outdoor gym club at Joffe Park, where he inspires a new generation and leads the advocacy for improvements to better serve the community.

Andrew Swarthout served in the United States Army with the 1st Cavalry Division during the Vietnam War. He achieved the rank of Specialist 4.

He was at the Battle at la Drang, later made famous in the bestselling book We Were Soldiers Once...and Young: Ia Drang – The Battle That Changed the War in Vietnam and a subsequent major motion picture.

Mr. Swarthout is a highly-decorated veteran who is recognized for his service and bravery. He has earned numerous medals and commendations, including two recently awarded Bronze Star Medals (BSM), Vietnam Award of Gallantry, Combat Medical Badge, Vietnam Service Medal, Presidential Unit Citation, Good Service Medal, and New York State Conspicuous Service Cross.

Following his combat service in Vietnam, Mr. Swarthout returned home to Yates County, where he has long-played an integral role in serving his fellow veterans, local veterans' organizations, and his community at large.

A staunch advocate on behalf of veterans, his community service has included being a longstanding member and officer of the Johnson-Costello American Legion Post 355 and the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 745, and Captain of the American Legion/VFW Honor Guard, serving as Chairman. Born and raised in Brooklyn, Ms. Tappin is a first-generation Caribbean American of Jamaican and Guyanese descent. Enlisting in the Reserve during her senior year at Tilden High School, she moved to Maryland for her undergraduate education in Psychology at Maryland's oldest Historically Black College and University, Bowie State University, where she graduated in 1999. She earned a Master of Arts in Counseling Psychology from Argosy University in Arlington, Virginia in 2007.

Ms. Tappin began her career as a 911 Dispatcher with the Montgomery County Police Department in Maryland. In 2010, she began working with the Baltimore County Crisis Response, in conjunction with the Baltimore County Police as a Mobile Crisis Clinician. She has worked as a psychotherapist, clinical administrator, and psychiatric emergency crisis evaluator in hospital emergency rooms, as well as in Corrections. In 2011, Ms. Tappin made the decision to move back to New York to give back to the City that gave so much to her foundational years.

Most recently, Ms. Tappin served as a Clinical Instructor with a local non-profit agency in New York City. In this capacity, she trained the officers of the New York City Police Department in crisis intervention and de-escalation techniques. Additionally, since 2017, Ms. Tappin has been a Military and Family Life Counselor. She uses her training as a Licensed Professional Counselor in New Jersey to assist service members who are either preparing for or returning from deployment.

With over 15 years of experience in the field of mental health, she currently is a Crisis Behavioral Health Clinician for Willow Health, a start-up virtual-care crisis clinic, and she is also in private practice as a psychotherapist. Having lived a life of service, Ms. Tappin continues to give back to the community through various civic organizations. JOSEPH A. THOMPSON

Joseph A. Thompson served in the United States Air Force and achieved the rank of Radar Operator.

Mr. Thompson was born in Staunton, Virginia and moved to the Bronx with his parents and three siblings at the age of five. He graduated from Morris High School in 1957 and enlisted in the United States Air Force in 1958, serving as a Radar Operator until he was honorably discharged in 1961.

In 1962, Mr. Thompson decided to join the New York City Police Department and was appointed the following year to the Vice Squad. After his promotion to Detective in 1967, Mr. Thompson worked in numerous squads throughout the City.

A steadfast maverick, Mr. Thompson visited Staunton in the mid-1960s and integrated a local segregated diner. Holding on to what he believed was right, he convinced fellow African Americans to break a social taboo by bowling at the for-Whites-only bowling alley.

In 1977, Mr. Thompson became the first full-time African American life insurance agent at New York Northwestern Mutual. In 2008, he was an elected delegate for Barack Obama's candidacy for President, signing the primary voting document at the Democratic National Convention in Colorado.

Mr. Thompson began his community service work in 1987, starting as a manager for the Pelham Parkway Little League (PPLL); he became its Vice President in 1989, a position he still holds today. In 1999, he co-founded the Allerton/Pelham Parkway Community Mobile Patrol and was appointed to Community Board 11 in 1997. In 2001, he was elected Second Vice Chair.

An asset to his community, Mr. Thompson diligently served as President of the 49th Precinct Community Council and Executive Director of the White Plains Road Business Improvement District. He was a facilitator for the 49th Precinct Clergy Council, and he was a member of the Einstein College Institutional Review Board and the Einstein-Montefiore Embryonic Stem Cell Research Oversight Committee. He has served as a member of the Neighborhood Initiatives Development Corporation's Board of Directors and chaired the Board of Directors for the Bronx Rebels Youth Football League.

Mr. Thompson has resided in The Bronx's Community Board 11 for over 47 years. He married his wife, Gladys Osorio, in 1969, and they are the proud parents of two children and two grandchildren.

MICHAEL LOUIS VULCANO

Michael Louis Vulcano served in the United States Marines and achieved the rank of Corporal.

Mr. Vulcano is a native New Yorker and the son of Italian immigrant parents from Calabria, Italy, who settled in Brooklyn with him and his eight siblings.

A proud family man, he is a son, brother, father, grandfather, and a greatgrandfather. A member of the Greatest Generation, Mr. Vulcano is also a proud World War II veteran.


After the bombing of Pearl Harbor, Mr. Vulcano answered his Nation's call at the age of 19. From Camp Lejeune in North Carolina, as a member of the 2nd Marine Battalion Company B, he boarded a ship that would take him and his fellow soldiers to islands he had never heard of in the Pacific.

He fought in two of the fiercest battles of WWII, the Battle of Okinawa and the Battle of Tarawa Island. The number of souls lost in these two battles is staggering. Mr. Vulcano achieved the rank of Corporal before being honorably discharged; he returned to his home in Brooklyn to rejoin his parents and eight siblings.

He never talks about the War, nor of his journey on ships that were tossed and turned in tumultuous storms at sea. Recently, his usual happy-go-lucky attitude turned somber, saying that often he awakes in the middle of the night to memories of the horror of war and the faces of friends that he lost. He goes back to sleep hoping that those thoughts and the sadness they bring will disappear. And when they do, they are replaced by the happiness that his family gives him.

Mr. Vulcano was happily married to his wife, Phyllis Russo, for 64 years. They had two daughters, Denise and Michele. He is the proud grandfather of Ashley and great-grandfather of Kalani and Keanu. The family grew up in Bayside, Queens in their three-family home, surrounded by extended family.

On April 23, 2023, Mr. Vulcano hit a major milestone when he turned 100 years old and achieved centenarian status. Today, he lives in Flushing, Queens with his daughter, Denise.

RUTH WELCH

Ruth Welch served in the United States Navy and earned the rank of Teleman-Petty Officer 2 (TE2).

A World War II veteran, Ms. Welch heard the call of duty to serve her Nation and bravely enlisted in the Navy in 1942, right after the United States entered the war. She served in the Women Accepted for Volunteer Emergency Services (WAVES).

She attended radio school in Wisconsin and was then stationed at the United States Naval Air Station, Joint Reserve Base in New Orleans, Louisiana. While serving her country, Ms. Welch has the distinction of being the first of five women on the base, where they trained aircraft pilots on the use of radios. Ms. Welch was discharged from the Navy in 1945.

After being discharged from the Navy, Ms. Welch joined the American Legion, where she has proudly served for over 77 years. She continues to attend the monthly meeting at the Smith-Wever Post 651 located in Sayville, New York.

Ms. Welch was born in Queens in 1922 and moved with her family to Baldwin in Nassau County some five years later. She is currently a resident of Sayville, New York. She graduated from Baldwin High School in 1940 and shortly after began work at an insurance company.

A pillar of her community, Ms. Welch is admired and respected by her family, friends, and peers.

KENNETH W. WINKLER

Kenneth W. Winkler served in the United States Air Force and the United States Army. He retired as a CWT Master Aviator Instructor/Examiner.

Mr. Winkler proudly served in the military for 22 years. From 1962 to 1966, he served with the Air Force in Vietnam. In 1969, he joined the Army, receiving his wings and warrant officer bars, and advanced flight training on Huey helicopters.

Between 1970 and 1975, Mr. Winkler served in Vietnam, Cambodia, Laos, and Germany before returning to the United States and training as an Instrument Examiner and Warrant Officer. From 1986 to 1990, he served on numerous missions in Honduras, El Salvador, Guatemala, the Philippines, and Zaire.

On February 28, 1971, Mr. Winkler earned the prestigious Distinguished Flying Cross for "heroism while participating in aerial flight," and for "voluntary action above and beyond the call of duty" as a Pilot and Gunner of an AH-1G armed helicopter supporting a battalion of ARV troops under siege in Laos. Mr. Winkler flew to the friendly position under challenging conditions and forced the enemy to retreat. Ultimately continuing his attack under intense anti-aircraft fire, Mr. Winkler countered with suppressive fire and destroyed the enemy emplacements.

Mr. Winkler retired as CW4 Master Aviator Instructor/Examiner in 1985. He continued flying for government agencies in Central America, Africa, the Philippines, and the West Indies until 1990. During his career, Mr. Winkler amassed more than 10,000 flight hours as a pilot, instrument examiner, and flight instructor in both fixed-wing and rotary-wing aircraft.

Mr. Winkler has earned numerous awards and commendations, including four Bronze Stars; 34 Air Medals; three Meritorious Service Medals; the Republic of Vietnam Campaign Ribbon with Device; Army Commendation Medal with two Bronze Oak Leaf Clusters; New York State Conspicuous Service Cross and Conspicuous Service Star; and a Humanitarian Service Medal for assisting during an earthquake in Naples, Italy in 1980.

An accomplished three-sport athlete, Mr. Winkler received an athletic scholarship to Hobart College in 1957. He was inducted into the Victor Central Schools Athletic Hall of Fame in 2004. Mr. Winkler has been an active member of American Legion-James Cooke Post 931 for over 20 years.

He met his wife, Olga, while serving in Germany. In 1975, they wed at First United Methodist Church in Canandaigua and are the proud parents of three children: Lea, Caroline, and Kurt.
