Dear Mayor de Blasio,

As your partners in government, we were surprised to hear the announcement that New York City will eliminate the Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP) for Summer 2020 in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. While we completely understand the health and public safety concerns posed by the traditional, in-person internship-based model of SYEP, we are deeply concerned with the cancelation of the program and with the lack of an alternative plan for the 75,000 young people and their families that benefit from it.

In 2019, State dollars paid for nearly 15% of the City's SYEP program at \$22.6 million. This funding, which is appropriated from New York's Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) block grant, goes to support subsidized wages for the lowest-income SYEP participants. The State's budget, signed by Governor Cuomo on April 2, 2020, included \$45 million for SYEP statewide, meaning that New York City can anticipate receiving level-funding for SYEP activities for Summer 2020.

State legislators work every year to make SYEP a priority and ensure that these funds are included in the budget. Keeping SYEP funded at last year's level was particularly difficult during this budget as we were dealing with a rapidly growing deficit which left us unable to restore numerous programs to prior year levels. We are disappointed that the City, in making the decision to eliminate the program, would put those dollars in jeopardy, particularly when our lowest-income constituents rely on them to keep households afloat in regular years, let alone today due to the pandemic, when unemployment numbers are expected to reach 500,000 in New York City alone. When the City's Department of Youth and Community Development (DYCD) initially gave nonprofit contractors only 24 hours to submit final program expenses, that meant that providers would be forced to lay off the very staff that would be critical in managing the distribution of the State dollars. Additionally, though DYCD cited health and safety concerns with the regular operation of the program, we have heard from the nonprofit contractors we represent that they had already been thinking of alternative program models that could safely take place remotely during Summer 2020. The very staff that were responsible for developing those program alternatives were the ones laid off last week as providers scrambled to comply with DYCD's decision.

We implore you to work swiftly, with input from your SYEP contractors and the young people that hope to participate in programming this summer, alongside the New York State Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance (OTDA), to ensure that New York City will find ways to move the \$22.6 million in State SYEP funding to the low-income families most impacted by COVID-19's spread. We are struck by the racial and economic disparities revealed in the recently released statistics on COVID-19 hospitalizations and deaths, and are acutely aware of how the economic impact caused by the pandemic will be felt hardest in the low-income communities that most benefit from the State's SYEP investment.

We look forward to working with you to resolve this issue.
