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

Completing census helps us move forward

There is no taking a break from this pandemic response, we know that. The personal loss, pain, and tragedy in so many places, and in so many lives, is immense. At the time of this writing, we will soon have lost more than 8,000 New Yorkers and it is a death toll that continues to climb.

For the families and loved ones of those lost, I hope that each of us, in our own ways, will extend thoughts of comfort and prayers of strength.

The social and economic costs are enormous, and deep-rooted. It is going to take an historic marshaling of public-private coordination, commitment, experience, know-how, and resources to find solid ground again, fix what is broken, and begin reclaiming the best (and better) ways forward.

For now, on this day, as we all continue doing our part day by day, one day at a time, I will focus on three points.

Point 1: As individual citizens, our commitment to the common good is Priority No. 1. It has to be because until we get this virus under control, there is no moving forward. We all must – and must is the key word – adhere to the "New York on Pause" guidelines that remain in effect until at least April 29. You can find these guidelines on coronavirus. health.ny.gov. Please read them again, and then keep putting them into practice. Do not let up, hold the line, and thank you for your cooperation.

Point 2: We stay together in this battle by staying informed - and we have to stay informed in order to continue exercising the personal responsibility the COVID-19 response demands for the foreseeable future, as well as to find the assistance we may need. And assistance is available. Not one of us is alone. I will remind you again that on my state Senate website, we maintain a "One-Stop Webpage" with links to local, state, and federal lifelines of help, recommendations, and support. This includes my office, which remains on call throughout this crisis.

Point 3: We have a high-alert responsibility right now as individuals to stay home and adhere to all of the "New York on Pause" directions. However, there is one other important task we can complete collectively as a community and as a state. It's simple, but it will make a great difference for all of us after we have brought this virus under control. Fill out and in the mail in mid-March. If not or if you've misplaced it, go to the Census website (2020census.gov) to complete it online, or complete it by phone at 844-330-2020.

In terms of our long-term, post-COVID19 recovery, completing the census is one way that you can help ensure resources locally and statewide. Yes, it's that important. The once-every-decade census achieves important goals, including determining, among other matters: how many representatives each state sends to Congress; the amount of federal funding state and communities are allocated for roads, schools, emergency services, and other critical services and infrastructure; and economic development decisions made by businesses and industries.

According to Census Bureau Director Dr. Steven Dillingham, "It has never been easier to respond on your own, whether online at 2020census.gov, over the phone, or by mail – all without having to meet a census taker. It's something everyone can do while practicing social distancing at home to make a difference today, tomorrow, and the next 10 years."
