
Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day

Dear Governor Cuomo:

Pursuant to subdivision six of §652 of the Labor Law, the Commissioner of Labor based upon a report and recommendation from the Director of the Budget, can temporarily suspend any scheduled increases to the minimum wage.

The minimum wage is scheduled to increase on December 31, 2020 from the current hourly rate of \$13 per hour to the statutorily scheduled rate of \$14 per hour on Long Island and Westchester County. It is also scheduled to increase from \$11.80 to \$12.50 per hour in the rest of the state outside of New York City, which currently has a minimum wage \$15 per hour.

The Senate Republican Conference has always stood by businesses, particularly small and midsized businesses that are the backbone of the State's economy.

We believe that any increase to the minimum wage would have great and far-reaching consequences for businesses that are only barely staying afloat in the current state of this pandemic. According to the National Federation of Independent Businesses (NFIB), 90 percent of small businesses that received Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) loans have entirely spent down those funds and are ready to initiate the process for loan forgiveness. PPP is a federal program designed to provide an incentive to small businesses to keep their workers on the payroll. Even with PPP and other programs, according to NFIB, approximately 20 percent of small business owners predict that they will go out of business in the next six months and another 19 percent anticipate that they will be out of business within a year. Any increases to the minimum wage are certain to exacerbate this problem.

We understand that countless individuals have struggled during this pandemic and continue to struggle. However, based upon the above and the best information available to us, we believe that increasing the minimum wage in the middle of the Covid-19 pandemic would do more harm than good to those we represent. The state must avoid inflicting additional economic hardship on

businesses and causing many small and medium size businesses, especially family-owned restaurants, to go out of business entirely - hurting businesses and workers alike.

Therefore, we respectfully request that you use your statutory authority to delay all increases in the minimum wage until the Covid-19 pandemic ends.

Dear Governor Cuomo:

We are writing to you on behalf of those men and women who serve on the frontline of our fight against the Coronavirus pandemic. We strongly urge that, before any plan for vaccination is implemented by New York State, that you ensure that our firefighters and all of our frontline emergency first responders are among the first to have access to the Coronavirus vaccine.

Many local volunteer firefighter and ambulance departments are struggling with bare-bones budgets and inadequate staffing levels in addition to the requirement that they continue operating at full capacity, ESPECIALLY during this time of crisis. This obviously puts them at extreme risk and danger, regardless of the uncertainty of the crisis, and when experts were uncertain of any effects of the Coronavirus, these individuals bravely placed their hands on patients to comfort and care for our friends and family who became compromised. If one first responder in a department comes down with the virus, they could force an entire agency to temporarily shut down endangering whole communities.

Governor, our dedicated and courageous emergency first responders put their lives on the line every time they respond to a 911 call to enter a burning building or hop in an ambulance and go to an emergency, and this pandemic has made their jobs even more stressful and dangerous to them and their colleagues and families. We need to ensure that the people we hope and expect will be there as the front-line of care for those who may have COVID-19 are among the top tier of essential personnel who can receive the vaccine. By protecting our firefighters and emergency first responders from the Coronavirus, we will better protect all citizens.

Earlier today, Senator Jim Tedisco and I wrote to Governor Cuomo and State Health Commissioner Howard Zucker urging them to protect our firefighters and all frontline emergency first responders from the coronavirus by ensuring that these essential workers are among the first to have access to the COVID-19 vaccine (our letter is pictured above).

Under the Governor's current COVID-19 vaccine distribution plan, firefighters, and some emergency first responders who are often the first on the scene of an emergency to treat sick and injured citizens and those who may be infected with the coronavirus in confined spaces such as the back of an ambulance, may not be able to get vaccinated until Phase 2. The Governor's current vaccine distribution plan is particularly concerning to volunteer firefighter and ambulance departments that have a small staff. If one first responder in a

department comes down with COVID-19 they could force the entire agency to temporarily shut down and endanger communities. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Advisory Committee on Immunization and Prevention is recommending that EMS workers be in Phase 1a of vaccine distribution.

That's why Senator Tedisco and I urged the Governor and Health Commissioner to move-up firefighters and all of New York's emergency first responders to the top tier, Phase 1a of being able to get vaccinated and be protected.
