## PARTIES DON'T MATTER.

Op-Ed by Senator Simcha Felder

I've seen a fair amount of coverage about my decision this legislative session to caucus with the Republicans. The news reports have been speculative, sometimes confusing, and often inaccurate. So I'm pleased to have an opportunity to explain things directly to you and clear up any questions with regard to why I've chosen this path.

Like many of you, I am a registered Democrat with fairly conservative views. In New York City—a place where winning a Democratic primary is equivalent to winning office—you must be a Democrat to have a say in City elections. So why join sides with the Republicans?

Having been born and schooled in the same district that I represent—having raised a family here and maintained a passionate involvement with our community—I believe that my thoughts are, for the most part, the same as yours. The decisions that I make politically are, what I think, best for us. I believe most of you would make the same decisions. There are exceptions, sure, but caucusing with the Republicans isn't one of them.

Which brings me to my decision.

At the end of the day, regardless of which lever people may have pulled for me—Democrat, Republican or Conservative—you don't want me

representing a party. You want me to represent you.

My decision to caucus with the Republicans was based on three things: First, I need to consider what's best for my constituents. Secondly, I need to consider what's best for New Yorkers. I believe that every government needs balance; that having a stacked deck with either party controlling all of the centers of power, either on a Federal or State level, is not in the people's best interests.

Third, I have to rely on my experience. That dictates that I stand

with the Republicans again. I've been with them for the last two legislative sessions—the last four years—and this has served New Yorkers well. We've

done great things together and seen success with many issues including protecting special needs families, free school transportation (a direct help to parents and their families), protecting the bodies of the deceased, and fighting the City's Bag Tax, to name a few.

The reason behind my decision was no more complicated than that. If it ain't broke, don't fix it. I stick to the belief that I must represent you as I'd like to be represented. More and more people are recognizing that it's not about the parties—it's about the issues.



## United Nations: "LET MY PEOPLE GO HOME!"

A group of New York lawmakers, Senator Simcha Felder and Council Member David Greenfield among them, and Jewish communal leaders came together as JCRC launched a coordinated effort to condemn Hamas for holding the bodies of two deceased Israeli soldiers and two Israeli civilians currently being held captive.

Also in attendance was Mr. Simcha Goldin, father of Hadar Golden, one of the soldiers whose body is being held by Hamas. He traveled to New York along with Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu to call on the United Nations to take responsibility in returning his son's body.

"The families of these brave soldiers have been denied the basic human right to the dignity of a proper burial according to our customs. The pain they are feeling is unfathomable," said Senator Felder who attended the press conference to show his support.

## Felder Appointed to Task Force on Counter Terrorism

In September, Senator Felder was appointed to the new NY State Senate Majority Task Force on Counter Terrorism and Public Protection by Senator Thomas Croci, Chair of the Task Force.

The Task Force's mission is to review and report on the Counter Terrorism / Public Protection activities that have occurred since September 11, 2001 and to make findings and recommendations, including proposing future legislative and administrative actions, that will promote the improved public safety of all New Yorkers.

"Terrorism wasn't born on September 11th," said Senator Felder. "Nevertheless, it took the scope of

our national catastrophe to open the eyes of those who didn't realize how dangerous a time we live in—a time when radical Islamist groups attempt to reshape the world by whatever monstrous means they deem necessary."

"New York remains a principal target," Senator Felder continued. "As such, I fully support the formation of this new task force to improve the counter terrorism and public protection efforts in our City and State."

### Safety and Security on McDonald Avenue

In an effort to improve the safety and security along McDonald Avenue, which has long been a dark and dangerous street, Senator Simcha Felder has secured funding to increase sidewalk lighting.

Under the new program, the NYC Department of Transportation has designed and installed special streetlights under the F train tracks so that the sidewalks along McDonald Avenue will have better lighting for pedestrians and will benefit drivers and cyclists as well. The first part of the project will run from Ditmas Avenue to Bay Parkway. The next phase will continue further south.

McDonald Avenue runs through the middle of the neighborhood, making it a very busy thoroughfare. With crime and terrorism on everyone's

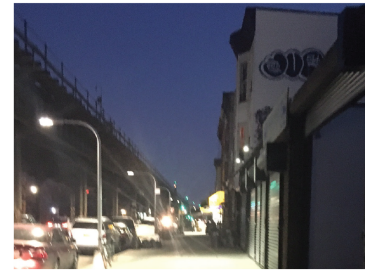
mind, this lighting project will be a monumental improvement. Currently, millions of dollars have been allocated to upgrade the lighting that will help residents feel safer and more secure.

"There is nothing more important than people's safety and security," said Senator Felder. "This lighting project will ensure that residents who walk along McDonald Avenue are out of harm's way and I thank the Department of Transportation for working with the community to make life safer for residents."

A similar project to improve the lighting at the entrances and exits to the F-train stations along McDonald Avenue was recently completed. For residents who use those stations at night, the dif-

ference has literally been night and day.

"There is so much out there to be worried about; walking down McDonald Avenue shouldn't be one of those things," concluded Senator Felder.

# Felder Urges Mayor on Three-Year IEPs

## State Senator Calls on NYC Mayor to Streamline Special Needs Services

At a hearing before state lawmakers in Albany on January 30th, New York City Mayor Bill de Blasio was once again urged by State Senator Simcha Felder to finally implement the long promised three-year Individualized Educational Plans (IEPs).

An IEP is a detailed, multi-page document containing all pertinent medical, developmental and academic information on students with any disabilities or special needs. It is vital to any New York State or City public or private school student obtaining any special education services.

Currently, New York City parents of students with IEPs, often children with significant intellectual and/or physical disabilities, must renew their children's IEPs at the start of each school year. The annual renewal is a burdensome study in tediousness and bureaucracy and parents have long requested that IEPs require renewal only once every three years.

"You testified here on May 4, 2016 before the Education Committee and made a commitment

at the time to parents of special needs children to finally implement, before the start of this school year, 3-year IEPs for special needs students that require no changes to their IEPs. That never occurred," Felder said at the hearing.

"And children and families are still suffering humiliation and financial hardship to maintain their IEPs by having to pay lawyers over and over and over again," he went on, "despite the fact that there are no [diagnostic] changes [to the IEP]. The example I gave last time was... a child [who] has Down syndrome, autism," said Felder. "There's no fix for that, unfortunately, and there's no need to force them to do it over and over again."

The longstanding public champion of children with disabilities ended on an upbeat note by thanking the Mayor for strides and improvements that were made. "But," said Felder, "that doesn't give me or anyone else a pass on doing whatever we have to do to help these families, so I sincerely hope that New Yorkers can count on your commitments in 2017."

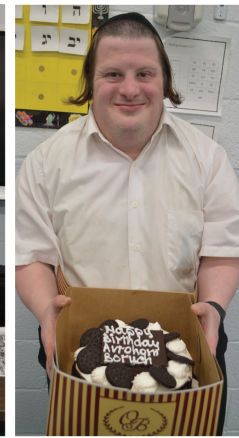

"WHODYA?" campaign - a stimulating, educational yet fun experience designed to foster appreciation for community workers and the important, but often unheralded, services they provide!

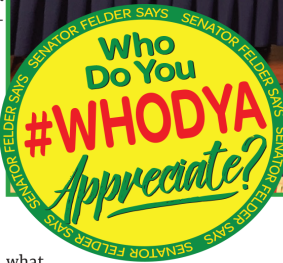
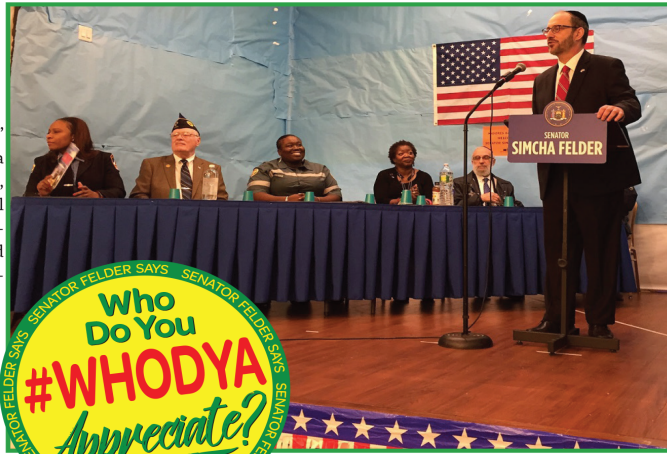

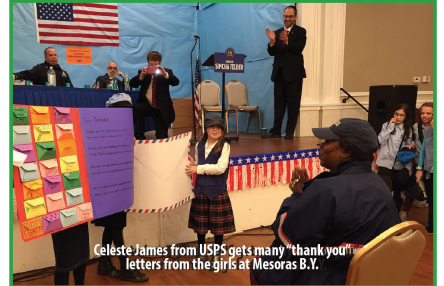
