### COMMENTARY | STATE SEN. TOM O'MARA, R-BIG FLATS Hope in the future of regional manufacturing

ot long ago, I toured the BorgWarner Morse Systems facility in Tompkins County, one of the region's most dynamic manufacturers. BorgWarner Morse Systems is a worldwide leader in the design and manufacturing of automotive chain systems and components for engine timing, automatic transmission, and four-wheel drive applications. Headquartered in Tompkins County, it operates 13 facilities in seven countries and employs more than 2,800 workers.

Approximately 70% of the vehicles on the road around the world carry a Morse Systems product. The company sells directly to major automotive manufacturers including Ford, General Motors, and Chrysler.

The Southern Tier and Finger Lakes regions remain home to numerous, world-class manufacturers like BorgWarner Morse Systems, A foundation of manufacturing is critical to the short- and long-term strength of the regional, statewide, and national economies.

In early October, the Greater Southern Tier BOCES (GST BOCES), Chemung County Chamber of Commerce, and other sponsors hosted nearly 20 area companies to highlight the fact that good, local jobs are available in manufacturing. This year's celebration of National Manufacturing Day provided hundreds of regional students from GST BOCES and area school districts a chance to interact with representatives from 16 local industries. Many local companies have highlighted the challenge of finding highly trained local workers

to fill job openings. It reflects a nationwide concern commonly called the "skills gap."

The United States Chamber of Commerce has summarized the gap, and the importance of an industry-educational-governmental partnership to address it, this way, "The overarching goal is to create a system that meets the immediate needs of employers today and adequately trains and prepares the workforce for generations to come. [We need to] establish a solid educational foundation for the duration of a student's participation in the public education structure. If we are going to compete in the global marketplace and develop a solid plan for shaping the workforce development agenda in this country, we must work together and share best practices to make a difference with the skills gap."

I serve on the state Senate Task Force on Workforce Development, which we established in 2015 to examine this trend in detail. The task force has focused on schools-based job training programs and other strategies to develop specific workforce skills for the economies of the future in high-tech manufacturing and other sectors. This year' state budget, for example, included a record level of funding for dozens of job training and workforce development initiatives, nearly all of them advocated by the task force. The Senate continued to act on a comprehensive legislative package to bolster other ongoing efforts, including legislation to: encourage high school students to participate in apprenticeship, pre-apprenticeship, and career

and technical education opportunities; establish a program to assist veterans in utilizing their military experience to build a civilian resume and gain access to employment; create a program within our state university system, including community colleges, to work with local businesses and industries to develop work force training programs to provide the skills needed for workers to find jobs in their communities; expand New York State's Pathways in Technology Schools (P-TECHs) and Early College High Schools to meet student demand and enhance educational performance; and increase access to career and tech programs at BOCES.

We must continue to encourage this critical collaboration between government, education, and private industry.

We also need to keep taking tax relief, regulatory reform, and other actions, at every level of government, to do what we can to ensure a business climate that helps our manufacturers expand, thrive, and create more good jobs for local workers.

Getting back to my recent tour of the BorgWarner Morse Systems plant. Three bottom-line reactions to the work taking place there come quickest to mind: Optimism. Potential. Pride.

Our ongoing local, state, and federal focus on building and strengthening the regional foundation of manufacturing is producing results, shows every sign of continuing to do so and, together, it delivers a convincing and hopeful message for the future of regional manufacturing.
