

Franklin Community Center Building Dedication



This past Friday, I took part in the Franklin Community Center, Inc. building dedication in Saratoga Springs. The Franklin Community Center is a non-profit service agency that was founded in 1983 in Saratoga Springs, and provides basic necessities and services to less fortunate individuals and families.

Elliot and Cathy Masie built the Masie Center on the east side of Saratoga Springs in 2001, and it quickly became one of the most notable buildings. Michael and Stacie Arpey gifted one million dollars to the Franklin Community Center, and their incredible generosity helped to facilitate the purchase of the Masie building, conveniently located right across the street from their 10 Franklin Street location,

allowing the organization to expand their services.

The building will be the fourth facility Franklin Community Center manages in order to bring basic necessities and services to the public, with administrative offices, a community room and a food pantry being housed at 10 Franklin Street, a distribution center across the corner at 101 Washington Street, and a 19-unit rental building at 95 Congress Street.

The Masie Center has offered business-focused online seminars and was an elearning think tank, extensively wired for online access, and this existing infrastructure will make it easier for the Franklin Center to communicate with clients.

The Franklin Center's programs include a food pantry, a free after-school program for local students and affordable housing for low-income individuals, as well as assisting with furniture, clothing and household needs, among others.

Over the past five years the growth in demand for the types of services and outreach that the Franklin Community Center provides made it clear that more square footage was needed. Since the start of the pandemic, the Franklin Community Center's food pantry has served 2,300 families with 588 families seeking services for the first time.

Elliot and Cathie Masie are thrilled that the Masie Center will have a new chapter, supporting the Franklin Center's mission, as the center uses the technologies and facilities in their new home to provide support, services, and programs.

The purchase of the Masie Center, and the expansion of the Franklin Community Center, will help ensure that families in Saratoga Springs have an inviting place to receive the resources they need for the years to come.

I also presented Kari Cushing, Executive Director of the Franklin Community Center with the NYS Senate Empire Award, and an official NYS Senate Proclamation. Additionally, I presented Michael and Stacie Arpey with the NYS Senate Commendation Award in recognition of their dedicated service and outstanding commitment to the community.

Congrats to the Franklin Center, and to Michael and Stacie Arpey, on this wonderful project!


Columbia County Honor a Veteran Program













On Monday morning, I had the privilege of taking part in Columbia County's wonderful Honor-A-Vet Program in Hudson. This ceremony recognized and honored the life and legacy of U.S. Army Veteran Donald Milton Johnston, whose service record (below) demonstrates his incredible bravery. I also presented the NYS Senate Liberty Medal (the highest civilian honor that can be bestowed by a member of the NYS Senate upon a resident of New York State) and a NYS Senate Proclamation, to Mr. Johnston's family. Monday's ceremony featured the Posting of the Colors and Rifle Squad by the Stuyvesant Falls Memorial VFW Post 9593, an invocation by John Neary, the Pledge of the Allegiance led by Columbia County Director of Veteran's Services, and United States Army Command Sergeant Major, Gary Flaherty, and a proclamation presented by Claverack Town Supervisor Clifford "Kippy" Weigelt on behalf of the Columbia County Board of Supervisors. God bless Donald Milton Johnston and all of our veterans. We appreciate you and are forever grateful for your service!

United States Army Veteran Donald M. Johnston

Donald M. Johnston was born April 22, 1918, to Barson and Grace Powell Johnston in Mellenville, NY. He attended Philmont Elementary and High School, graduating in June of 1935. Prior to his enlistment, he worked as a mechanic. Donald entered the United States Army on August 8, 1942, in Albany, NY as a 2nd Lieutenant and was promoted to 1st Lieutenant in May of 1944.

Lt. Donald M. Johnston was assigned to the 8th Air Force, 303 Bomber Group (Hells Angels), 360 Squadron as a B-17G pilot in the ETO. Stationed at Molesworth, England, he flew 36 missions over France and Germany. After flying the B-17 named "Iza Vailable Too" on a bombing mission of a railway station in Berlin, he received flak damage causing a fire on his #2 engine. In the after-action report, he stated: "Flak had damaged the fuel line and the engine caught fire when the fuel booster pump was turned on. At about 300 feet over the runway, the #4 engine became a ball of fire. As I cleared the runway, onto the grass side, my main concern was injuring any of our crew as they cleared our burning aircraft. Alone I departed through the cockpit side window to the left-wing."

What was left of his B-17 was used as spare parts. 1st Lt. Don M. Johnston returned to the states and was assigned to the 563rd AAF Base Unit. He was honorably discharged on November 14, 1945, at Drew Field, Fl.

For his service, 1st Lt. Donald M. Johnston was awarded the following: Distinguished Flying Cross, Air Medal w/3 Bronze Oak Leaf Clusters, Good Conduct Medal, American Campaign Medal, and the EAME Campaign Medal. Don returned home and was employed at B.W. Johnston Construction Co., and later was the Maintenance Supervisor at Taconic Hills Ockawamick Central School; where he retired in 1984. Active in his community, he was a member of Philmont Rod and Gun Club (life), Am. Legion Post #252, Commissioner of Mellenville Fire District, and Claverack Republican Club (charter member), and the Philmont Santa Claus Club.

Don passed away on February 2, 2009, and was interned in the Sacred Heart Cemetery, Philmont, NY. He left behind three children Marcia, Mary, and Michael, 8 grandchildren, and several great-grandchildren. He was 91 years old
