LEADING THE FIGHT TO AUTHORIZE MONEY FOR ROAD PROJECTS

After weeks of constant pressure from my colleagues and me in the Senate Republican Conference, the Senate passed legislation to authorize the expenditure of funds necessary to complete capital construction projects that have been stymied by Governor Paterson and Senate Democrats. The legislation does not include any new spending on projects, but rather would allow funds previously allocated for road and bridge construction projects, as well as for capital improvement projects for the State University of New York (SUNY), to be released to continue construction and keep people working.

Several weeks ago, the Governor made a unilateral decision to suspend payments on current capital projects, and Senate Democrats have refused to include the payments as part of the emergency extenders – passed in lieu of a state budget – regardless of the fact that contractors have signed agreements with the state with the understanding that payment would be forthcoming. Therefore, to safeguard hundreds of projects and thousands of jobs, I joined my fellow Republicans by proposing amendments to the extenders that included the necessary funding for road and bridge construction – the overwhelming majority of which is Upstate – and SUNY capital improvements. Unfortunately, each amendment was voted down by the Senate Majority, and as a result, contractors across New York State have shut down projects and announced layoffs.

With more and more New Yorkers' jobs in jeopardy, Senate Democrats finally listened to the concerns of non-New York City Senators, and agreed to legislation that would circumvent the Governor's decision to suspend payments for Upstate capital projects and reinstate critical funds for infrastructure improvements. It is now imperative that the heavily-Democratic Assembly follows the Senate's lead and pass similar legislation.
