JOHN HARVEY CONNELLY

Staff Sergeant, U.S. Air Force 7 Years of Service

NOMINATED BY

What inspired you to join the military?

In 1960, after graduating from Aviation Mechanic School and unable to afford college. I met with a USAF recruiter, took the entry exam, and enlisted. I trained at Lackland AFB and Chanute AFB for Aircraft Instrument Repair. Best decision I made.

What moment in your service do you remember the most?

In April 1961, I received my first airbase assignment after Tech School. We flew to Greenland. From my window seat, I saw only snow, a few aircraft, and buildings built on big blocks. A large sign read: "Welcome to Thule Greenland, the top of the world." One of those elevated buildings became my home for the next year. On the tarmac were about 10 F-101 Voodoos, 6 F-102 Delta Daggers, a few C-41 cargo planes, and several rescue helicopters. These were the aircraft I serviced with my instrument training.

What valuable lessons or skills did you learn from your time in the military? Communicating with men and women from different backgrounds made for interesting conversations. One of my drill instructors said, "It's harder to listen and learn something than to speak and say the wrong thing... sometimes silence is golden." I have tried to follow that lesson in my life.

What do you love most about America?

Our freedoms. In the USA, we can drive almost anywhere without many restrictions, on well-maintained highways and tollways. Travel abroad is rewarding, but here in the USA, we have by far the best all-around freedoms.

What impact has your nominee had on the lives of yourself and others?

John Connelly has had an impact on my life through the American Legion and my interactions with him on projects and concerns around our village community. John has "given back" in his work with the veterans, but also to the community, as their business supports many local charities and needs, especially Boy/Girl Scouts. John is a quiet leader within the community. He is a man of action and a man of deep integrity and love for his fellow man. His honor and love of country is as strong as I've seen.

Fred was instrumental in helping keep the VA open in Canandaigua as a member of the CARES Committee. He was an inspiration to me to join the military and follow in his footsteps.

What inspired you to join the military?

Serving in the Army was something I always wanted to do as a child. I always knew I would serve.

What moment in your service do you remember the most?

I was among the first 1,000 assault troops that went into Iraq. I saw active combat for almost two full years of my Army service.

The biggest lesson I learned in the Army was accountability. Before going in, I was very unorganized, and when serving, I learned organization and how to lead and work with people as a squad leader for two years.

What moment in your service do you remember the most?

My father never forgot the torpedo hits, the kamikaze planes destroying ships, the burials at sea, and the accidental and horrific killing of one of his shipmates which he witnessed. He kept a detailed journal of his life on the USS *Carolina*, which we have scanned and submitted to the BB55 museum.

What valuable lessons or skills did you learn from your time in the military? Life in the Navy taught Dad to look at life with maturity, dignity and courage. He never gave up on fighting "the good fight."

What do you love most about America?

Dad embraced freedom. Freedom to do what was needed to achieve goals and happiness.

What impact has your nominee had on the lives of yourself and others?

My father was a man of dignity, strength, and courage; a true life's role model. He labored at Kodak supporting six children by lifting 50-gallon drums filled with toxic chemicals for film processing. He often came home with orange-tinted skin, even after showering.

What do you love most about America?



What impact has your nominee had on the lives of yourself and others? Dick was my father. He taught me the values I have tried to live my life by.


