COMMITTEE JURISDICTION AND OVERVIEW

The New York State Senate Standing Committee on Cities has legislative oversight responsibilities for issues arising under General City Law (except select provisions covered by the Committee on Energy and Telecommunications), Second Class Cities Law, General Municipal Law (where referring to those cities with a population of one million or more), and Municipal Home Rule Law (which is also covered by the Committee on Local Government and includes New York City). The Committee considers issues particular to New York City, including the NYC Administrative Code (not all provisions), the NYC Charter, Real Property Tax Law affecting NYC, and issues arising under the General Business Law relating to New York City, or Real Property Tax Law relating to New York City.

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During the 2019 Legislative Session 100 bills were referred to the Committee for its review. Of these bills, 25 were reported from the Committee. 12 bills were passed by the Senate, and 8 passed in both houses. This work was conducted through a series of 6 committee meetings. A list of all bills that were reported from the committee is provided at the end of this report.
