

COMMITTEE JURISDICTION AND OVERVIEW

The New York State Senate Standing Committee on Codes has legislative oversight responsibilities for issues concerning the Penal Law, the Criminal Procedure Law, the Civil Rights Law, and certain parts of the Executive Law.

During the 2019 Legislative Session, approximately 483 bills were referred to the committee for its review. Of these bills, 59 were reported from the committee, 31 were passed by the Senate, and 19 passed in both houses. This work was conducted through a series of seven committee meetings. A list of all bills that were reported from the committee is provided at the end of this report.

In addition to its regular meetings, the committee held four hearings during the off-session. Topics of these hearings included the repeal of Civil Rights Law section 50-a, and the implementation of the new discovery laws enacted through S1509 – Part LLL of the annual budget.

COMMITTEE HIGHLIGHTS

In 2019, 18 of the 483 bills referred to the Standing Committee on Codes passed both houses of the Legislature. Of these bills, the Governor has signed 19 and vetoed zero.
