Dear Senator Stewart-Cousins:

It is my pleasure to submit the annual report of the Senate Standing Committee on Higher Education for the 2019 legislative session. The committee remains committed to strengthening higher education in New York State, as well as overseeing professional licensure issues as described in the Education Law.

The Committee on Higher Education reported out of Committee two historic bills at its first two meetings in January. In past sessions, these bills had been held in committee. The first bill to move through the committee was S.1046 by Senator Hoylman, which prohibits mental health professionals from engaging in conversion therapy with clients under the age of 18. This legislation, which became Chapter #7 of 2019 will protect the physical, social and psychological well-being of minors.

The second historical measure reported out of committee and signed into law was S.1250 by Senator Sepulveda, the Jose Peralta New York State DREAM Act. This legislation gives undocumented and other students access to New York State's grants and scholarship programs to offset the cost of higher education. It enables undocumented students to apply for TAP, the Excelsior Scholarship and other programs not previously available to them.

The Higher Education Committee reviewed 200 bills which were referred to the committee; 54 bills were reported; 38 passed the Senate with 12 passing both houses. Eight bills have been chaptered and 4 vetoed by the Governor. The committee also approved 8 gubernatorial nominations.

In the adopted budget, restoration of cuts to the opportunity programs that assist low income and minority students was achieved. The Legislature also provided an additional \$12.01 million for community college base aid and supported the 98% floor of the 2018-2019 budget.

In conclusion, I would like to thank the committee for its continued support and commitment throughout the 2019 legislative session. I remain dedicated to ensuring that higher education is accessible, affordable and of the highest quality for all students. I look forward to working with the committee members and the entire Senate on the issues affecting higher education in the state.

COMMITTEE JURISDICTION AND OVERVIEW

The Senate Higher Education Committee is charged with the review and development of legislation addressing postsecondary education for New York State. This includes legislation dealing with the Board of Regents as well as more than 50 professions licensed by the State Education Department.

The committee's jurisdiction, therefore, covers a broad range of areas including maintaining the quality of New York's public, independent and proprietary colleges and universities, continuing the state's long tradition of providing the nation's most generous student financial aid programs, and providing institutional aid to all sectors of higher education. In addition, the committee plays a key role in program quality, access and opportunities for professional education, encourages academic and private sector cooperation, promotes research, and facilitates elementary and postsecondary partnerships. Furthermore, the committee is deeply involved with the process by which practitioners acquire, demonstrate and maintain professional skills. A major component of the committee's work is to consider change and expansion to the scope of practice of the state's professions, as well as to consider the licensure of newly created professions.

Another important responsibility of the committee is to consider gubernatorial and mayoral nominations to the various boards, task forces and work groups within the higher education community.

COMMITTEE HIGHLIGHTS

During the 2019 Session, the Higher Education Committee held eleven meetings and seven hearings. The Committee's first actions passed historic legislation including S.1046 (Hoylman) that prohibited mental health professionals from engaging in conversion therapy. The legislation passed both houses and became Chapter #7 in 2019. Another historical measure reported out of the committee and signed into law was S. 1250 (Sepulveda) which enacted the Jose Peralta New York State Dream Act. This give undocumented students access to the State's grants and scholarship programs to offset the cost of higher education.

The committee reviewed and passed legislation dealing with professions regulated by Title VIII of the Education Law. A significant measure that became law was S6517 (Stavisky) that defined the practice of registered pharmacy technicians, operating in Article 28 facilities, giving pharmacists greater assistance to provide quality service to patients.

On April 10, 2019, the Senate Higher Education Committee held a hearing to explore ways to provide better information to students, parents, and consumers on how to make decisions concerning a proprietary degree granting college and licensed career schools in New York State. The hearing produced new legislation for the Committee to consider including S.5562 (Stavisky), S.5581A (Stavisky), S5598 (Thomas) and S5799B (Thomas).

For the first time ever, the Senate Higher Education Committee held statewide hearings on the cost of public Higher Education. Between October 24, 2019 and November 1, 2019, the Committee held a series of five hearings in New York City, New Paltz, Buffalo, Syracuse and Long Island. Hundreds attended and legislators heard from the higher education community, including students, faculty, college presidents, SUNY and CUNY system administrators, campus administrators, faculty union representatives, and consumer advocates. Topics covered included the Excelsior Scholarship, the TAP GAP, room and board, transportation, local housing markets, the cost of textbooks and associated access costs, meal plans, student homelessness, mental health services, food insecurity, and other topics of importance to students, faculty, and school administration.

A hearing was also held on December 16, 2019, in New York City, on capital funding needs, since the State has not had a 5-year capital plan since 2008.

Additionally, of the 52 bills reported out of the Higher Education Committee 43 passed the Senate and are listed below.

TWO HOUSE BILLS

In 2019, thirteen of the two hundred bills referred to the Standing Committee on Higher Education passed both houses of the Legislature. Of these bills. The Governor has signed nine and vetoed four.
