

## **REPORT ON THE 2020-21 ADOPTED BUDGET**

### **ALL STATE AGENCIES AND OPERATIONS**

#### **Addiction Services and Supports, Office of**

##### *State Operations (S.7500-B)*

- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive recommendation of \$139.6 million.

##### *Aid to Localities (S.7503-C)*

- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive recommendation of \$591.5 million as follows:
  - Restore \$100,000 for SAFE Foundation, Inc.
  - Restore \$350,000 for Recovery and Community Outreach Center.
  - Restore \$450,000 for Save the Michaels of the World, Inc.
  - Restore \$25,000 for Camelot of Staten Island.

### *Article VII Proposal (S.7508-B)*

- PART HHH -- The Adopted Budget omits the Executive proposal related to the proposed state fair extension, which extends the amount of time security guards can be hired (15 days to 20 days) without the requirements of the Security Guard Act applying.

## **Alcoholic Beverage Control, Division of**

### *State Operations (S.7500-B)*

- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive recommendation of \$47.62 million and eliminates \$34.31 million in funding for the Office for Cannabis Management.

*Article VII Proposal (S.7505-B)*

- Part CC -- The Adopted Budget omits the Executive proposal to create a new alcohol license for in-state higher education institutions to allow both retail and manufacturing privileges.
- Part DD -- The Adopted Budget omits the Executive proposal to permit the sale of alcohol at traditional movie theaters.
- Part EE -- The Adopted Budget omits the Executive proposal to allow for alcohol manufacturers and wholesalers to have ownership stakes in retailers and vice versa.
- Part FF -- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive proposal to align the hours of alcohol sales in all Port Authority-managed international airports.

**Audit and Control, Department of**

*State Operations (S.7500-B)*

- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive recommendation of 342.6 million.

*Aid to Localities (S.7503-C)*

- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive recommendation of \$32.03 million,

- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive recommendation of \$43.5 million.

*Article VII Proposal (S.7506-B)*

- Part M -- The Adopted Budget omits the Executive proposal regarding a foster child's placement in a Qualified Residential Treatment Program, as required under the federal Family First Prevention Services Act (FFPSA).
- Part N -- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive proposal to shift the state share for Committee on Special Education (CSE) residential placements to the local school districts by requiring a sunset date of March 31, 2021.
- Part R -- The Adopted Budget includes a new part that changes the evidentiary standard from "some credible evidence" to a "fair preponderance of evidence" when investigating allegations of child abuse and maltreatment transmitted to the Statewide Central Register (SCR) for Child Abuse and Maltreatment. Indicated reports of child maltreatment will also be conditionally sealed for eight years.

**City University of New York (CUNY)**

*State Operations (S.7500-B)*

- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive recommendation of \$2.99 billion as follows:
  - Restore \$1.5 million for the CUNY School of Labor and Urban Studies.
  - Add \$250,000 for the CUNY Pipeline Center at the Graduate Center.

- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive recommendation of \$1.66 billion as follows:

*Capital Projects (S.7504-C)*

- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive recommendation of \$685 million.

*Article VII Proposals (S.7506-B)*

- Part D -- The Adopted budget modifies the Executive proposal as described under State University of New York.

## **Civil Service, Department of**

### *State Operations (S.7500-B)*

- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive recommendation of \$56.7 million.

### *Aid to Localities (S.7503-C)*

- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive recommendation of \$2 million.

### *Article VII Proposal (S.7505-B)*

- Part W -- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive proposal to allow public employers to share contact information of new hires with employee organizations without risking an improper practice charge.
- Part QQ -- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive proposal to ensure pay equity at state and local public authorities.

## **Commission of Correction, State**

### *State Operations (S.7500-B)*

- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive recommendation of \$3 million.

### *Article VII Proposal (S.7505-B)*

- Part OO -- The Adopted Budget omits the Executive proposal to authorize shared county jails.

## **Corrections and Community Supervision, Department of**

### *State Operations (S.7500-B)*

- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive recommendation of \$3 billion.

### *Aid to Localities (S.7503-C)*

- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive recommendation of \$29.5 million.

### *Capital Projects (S.7504-C)*

- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive recommendation of \$425 million.

### *Article VII Proposals (S.7505-B)*

- Part F- - The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive proposal to authorize the expedited closure of state correctional facilities in fiscal year 2020-2021 to require the Department of Corrections and Community Supervision to report back to the Legislature on the success of staff relocation efforts.
- Part G -- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive proposal to transfer adolescent offenders from the custody of the department of Corrections and Community Supervision (DOCCS) to the Office of Children and Family Services (OCFS).
- Part H -- The Adopted Budget omits the Executive proposal to expand the preferred source status of the correctional industries program known as Corcraft.

## **Council on the Arts**

### *State Operations (S.7500-B)*

- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive recommendation of \$4.4 million.

### *Aid to Localities (S.7503-C)*

- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive recommendation of \$42.6 million as follows:
  - Restore \$50,000 for the Museum of the City of New York.
  - Restore \$50,000 for the Bronx Museum of the Arts,

## **Criminal Justice Services, Division of**

### *State Operations (S.7500-B)*

- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive recommendation of \$84.3 million.

### *Aid to Localities (S.7503-C)*

- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive recommendation of \$200.6 million as follows:
  - Add an additional \$38 million to the \$2 million appropriation in the Criminal Justice Discovery Fund Account to support implementation of discovery.
  - Restore \$15.8 million to support Senate and Assembly legislative adds.
  - Carve out \$2.8 million LSAF appropriation to support Assembly legislative restorations for civil and/or criminal legal services.
  - Carve out \$1.4 million LSAF appropriation to support Senate legislative restorations for civil and/or criminal legal services.
  - Carve out \$600,000 in Byrne JAG funding, which will be equally split and distributed by both houses to support crime reductions programs.

### *Capital Projects (S.7504-C)*

- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive recommendation of \$25 million.

### *Article VII Proposal (S.7505-B)*

- Part A -- The Adopted Budget extends all proposals related to criminal justice for one year.
- Part B -- The Adopted Budget omits the Executive proposal to expand the internet activity reporting requirements for sex offenders.
- Part C -- The Adopted Budget omits the Executive proposal to close the “rape intoxication loophole” by amending the Penal Law to clarify that a person can be incapable of consent when voluntarily intoxicated.
- Part D -- The Adopted Budget omits the Executive proposal to allow the Division to hire certain mental health professionals without obtaining a waiver from the State Education Department.

- Part E -- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive proposal to establish a District Attorneys' Discovery Compensation Fund. The Fund will be called the Criminal Justice Discovery Compensation Fund, and will be funded with \$40 million per year for two years from the Manhattan District Attorney's deferred prosecution agreement funds. The funding will stop after two years, though the reporting requirements and remaining funds will continue.
- Part K -- The Adopted Budget omits the Executive proposal to restrict the sale and possession of unfinished firearm frames and receivers.
- Part M -- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive proposal to allow police officers to seize firearms, rifles, and shotguns upon responding to a domestic violence incident. Police will be required to hold seized weapons for up to two years, and must return seized weapons after 48 hours if there is no legal impediment to doing so.
- Part N -- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive proposal to ban the possession of firearms, rifles, and shotguns based on out-of-state convictions that are similar to serious offenses under the Penal Law. The Division will be required to publish a list, and update it annually, of out-of-state crimes that match New York's serious offenses. This part will only apply to out-of-state convictions entered after the effective date.
- Part O -- The Adopted Budget omits the Executive proposal to require the reporting of certain information relating to firearms, rifles, and shotguns to the State and federal governments.
- Part P -- The Adopted Budget omits the Executive proposal to allow the Department of Mental Health to share certain information with the Division of Criminal Justice Services for the purposes of sharing it with other states.
- Part Q -- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive proposal to establish a new Class A misdemeanor for Domestic Violence. In order to ensure that domestic violence convictions can be properly identified on criminal background checks, the Adopted Budget requires District Attorneys to use existing procedures, and requires court clerks to submit conviction records to the Division within three business days.
- Part R -- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive proposal to establish two degrees of Domestic Act of Terrorism Motivated by Hate and a Domestic Terror Task Force.
- Part UU -- The Adopted Budget adds a new proposal to update the State's bail law. It expands the list of bail eligible qualifying offenses, creates a mechanism for repeat offenders to be assigned bail, expands reporting requirements, provides for a comprehensive review of the efficacy of the new law and tools to respond to racial bias in the criminal justice system.
- Part HHH -- The Adopted Budget adds a proposal to update the criminal discovery law. It extends the initial discovery response deadline and provides clarification in the law to ease the burden related to discovery responses, protections for victims and witnesses, and a range of tools to enable law enforcement to respond to discovery requests while ensuring public safety.

- Part FF -- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive proposal to extend for one year the authorization of the UDC to administer the Empire State Economic Development Fund.
- Part GG -- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive proposal to amend the Economic Transformation Facility Redevelopment Program by extending eligibility to communities affected by prison closures until March 31, 2021.
- Part BBB -- The Adopted Budget omits the Executive proposal to consolidate the Centers of Excellence into the Centers for Advanced Technology.
- Part III -- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive proposal to allow the Community Development Financial Institution Fund to accept monies from alternate sources by prohibiting the transfer of monies from the Fund to any other funds managed by the Corporation,

## **Education Department, New York State**

### *State Operations (S.7500-B)*

- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive recommendation of \$612 million.

### *Aid to Localities (S.7503-C)*

- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive recommendation of \$37.15 billion with the following modifications:
  - Ensure every school district is held harmless in Foundation Aid and receives the same amount as 2019-20.
  - Omit the consolidation of expense-based aids into Foundation Aid
  - Provide full funding for expense-based aids at the current law level of \$8.99 billion, an increase of \$96 million over 2019-20 school year levels.
  - Provide \$1.128 billion in Federal funding through the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund and the Governor's Emergency Education Relief Fund. This funding offsets a \$1.128 billion Pandemic Adjustment on a dollar-to-dollar basis for each district, ensuring every school district receives 2020-21 school aid at current law funding levels.
  - Omit \$39 million of the Executive's proposed competitive grants.
  - Provide \$10 million for student mental health support grants to school districts and \$1 million for civics curriculum.
  - Omit the Executive's proposed \$24.9 million for New York City charter schools and maintains parity between school districts, charter schools, and nonpublic schools.
  - Restore \$12 million for Yonkers City School District.
  - Omit the Executive's proposed \$5 million increase for Nonpublic STEM and \$5.8 million for Mandated Services Aid.

*Capital Projects (S.7504-C)*

- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive recommendation of \$62 million.

*Article VII Proposals (S.7506-B)*

- Part A -- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive proposal related to school aid to:
  - Modify general support for public schools for the 2020-21 school year as a result of federal CARES funding;

- Modify charter school tuition for the 2020-21 school year as a result of federal CARES funding;
- Omit the consolidation of expense-based aid;
- Omit the limitation on building aid reimbursement;
- Omit the limitation on transportation aid reimbursement;
- Omit the freezing of school aid claims based on the November data;
- Omit the allowance of school districts, private schools, or BOCES to apply for waivers from certain special education requirements;
- Omit the reissuance of surrendered, revoked, or terminated charters;
- Modify the expansion of curriculum to specify instruction on civics, diversity and the role of religious tolerance;

- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive recommendation of \$30.39 million.

*Aid to Localities (S.7503-C)*

- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive recommendation of \$31.62 million in reappropriation authority.

*Capital (S.7504-C)*

- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive recommendation of \$16 million.

*Article VII Proposal (S.7505-B)*

- Part JJ -- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive proposal to trigger automatic manual recounts in elections with small margins of victory by differentiating the triggering margin of victory on the basis of the amount of ballots cast in the election.
- Part SS -- The Adopted Budget omits the Executive proposal to ban contributions from foreign-influenced corporations.
- Part AAA -- The Adopted Budget modifies a new Executive proposal to amend the section of law addressing time off to vote by returning the law to the state of its enactment prior to the Fiscal Year 2019 Executive Budget, provided that employees shall be entitled to time off to vote on any voting day, including early voting days, provided that such employee does not have sufficient time to vote on any other voting day, including early voting days.

*Article VII Proposal (S.7506-B)*

- Part TT -- The Adopted Budget accepts a new Executive proposal to authorize the State Board of Elections to omit from the presidential primary ballot candidates who have suspended or terminated their campaign.

*Article VII Proposal (S.7508-B)*

- Part ZZZ -- The Adopted Budget accepts a new Executive proposal to codify the December 2019 recommendations of the Campaign Finance Reform Commission.

## **Employee Relations, Office of**

### *State Operations (S.7500-B)*

- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive recommendation of \$8.7 million.

## **Energy Research and Development Authority**

### *Capital Projects (S.7504-C)*

- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive All Funds recommendation of \$18.2 million, an increase of \$500,000 over SFY 2019-20 levels.

### *Article VII Proposal (S.7508-B)*

- PART HH -- The Adopted Budget accepts the Executive's proposal to authorize an electric and gas corporation assessment to pay for programs at the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority.

## **Environmental Conservation, Department of**

### *State Operations (S.7500-B)*

- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive All Funds recommendation of \$464.8 million, an increase of \$5 million over SFY 2019-20 levels.

### *Aid to Localities (S.7503-C)*

- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive recommendation by restoring \$430,000 for local environmental programs.

### *Capital Projects (S.7504-C)*

- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive All Funds recommendation of \$7.3 billion as follows:
  - Modifies the Environmental Protection Fund (EPF) by restoring funding for zoos, botanic gardens, and aquaria, restoring funding for farmland protection, and increasing funding for municipal recycling projects. The Adopted Budget also omits language allowing the EPF to be used for personal service expenses.
  - Modifies the \$3 billion Environmental Bond Act appropriation to include \$1 billion for restoration and flood risk reduction, \$700 million for climate change mitigation, \$550 million for open space land conservation and recreation, and \$550 million for water quality improvement and resilient infrastructure.
- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive recommendation to include \$500,000 in capital projects funding to conduct a comprehensive feasibility study that evaluates using New York City's water supply to provide Nassau County with an additional source of drinking water.

*Article VII Proposal (S.7508-B)*

- Part PP -- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive’s proposal to ban polystyrene food packaging and polystyrene packaging peanuts commencing January 1, 2022, by clarifying exemptions, applicability, and preemption.
- Parts QQ and RR -- The Adopted Budget modifies Executive’s proposal for a \$3 billion Environmental Bond Act. Proceeds from the bonds are allocated as follows: (1) not less than \$1 billion for restoration and flood risk reduction, including wetland and stream restoration; moving or lifting flood-prone structures or infrastructure; purchase of flood-prone private property from willing sellers; relocation, repair or raising of flood-prone roads; removal or replacement of dams, bridges and culverts; projects to protect, recover and restore at-risk fish and wildlife species; (2) up to \$550 million for open space land acquisition (including purchase of conservation easements on farmland), and recreational infrastructure such as parks, campgrounds, nature centers and fish hatcheries; (3) up to \$700 million for climate change mitigation, including green buildings projects; carbon sequestration; urban forestry; projects to address urban heat island effects; and projects to reduce pollution in environmental justice communities; and (4) not less than \$550 million for water quality improvement and resilient infrastructure, including control of stormwater using green infrastructure; control of agricultural nutrient runoff; extending or establishing sewer lines; replacement of lead pipes; measures to address harmful algal blooms; control of point and nonpoint discharges to water; establishing riparian buffers; and purchase of equipment for monitoring soil health. The act requires the Department of Environmental Conservation to make every practicable effort to ensure that 35% of expenditures benefit environmental justice communities. Submission of the Bond Act to the voters in November is conditioned upon the Director of the Division Budget certifying to the Secretary of State that the bond debt will not adversely affect funding for authorized capital projects or essential governmental services.
- Part SS -- The Adopted Budget omits the Executive proposal to establish a product stewardship program for carpets and mattresses.
- Part TT -- The Adopted Budget omits the Executive proposal to eliminate the jurisdictional requirement that wetlands be mapped and to expand the Department of Environmental Conservation’s jurisdiction to include wetlands less than 12.4 acres if they are of “unusual importance.”
- Part UU -- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive proposal to authorize temporary and permanent easements on parklands in Nassau County, the Village of East Rockaway, and the Village of Rockville Center for the purpose of completing the Bay Park Conveyance Project by requiring that disturbed areas are to be returned to parkland purposes.
- Part VV -- The Adopted Budget omits the Executive proposal to authorize the Department of Environmental Conservation to require financial security for the plugging of abandoned and orphaned oil and gas wells.
- Part WW -- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive proposal to ban high-volume hydraulic fracturing by also imposing a moratorium on applications for gelled propane hydraulic fracturing filed with the Department of Environmental Conservation after the effective date of the bill.

- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive recommendation of \$17.85 million.

## **Financial Services, Department of**

### *State Operations (S.7500-B)*

- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive recommendation of \$378.84 million.

### *Aid to Localities (S.7503-C)*

- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive recommendation of \$60.31 million and provides \$75,000 for the Pilot Program for the Entertainment Industry Employees.

### *Article VII Proposal (S.7508-B)*

- Part LL -- The Adopted Budget omits the Executive proposal to license debt collection entities.
- Part MM -- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive proposal to regulate student loan consultants by substituting the original proposal with S.2426A (Kaplan) and removing the clean up provision for the student loan servicers law, which would allow DFS to require servicers to submit fingerprints for criminal history record checks.
- Part NN -- The Executive proposal to expand DFS regulatory oversight of unfair and abusive practices was omitted from the final bill.
- Part OO -- The Executive proposal to allow financial institutions to place holds on transactions to protect vulnerable adults from financial fraud was omitted from the final bill.
- Part QQ -- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive's proposal to create the Behavioral Health Parity Compliance Fund and mandate DFS/DOH rulemaking regarding behavioral health parity by October 1, 2020, such that the Behavioral Health Parity Compliance Fund was created and will be used to fund the ombudsman program but DFS/DOH rulemaking is not required. (This part was formerly located at S.7507A, Part Z.)

### *Article VII Proposal (S.7507-A)*

- Part C -- The Adopted Budget intentionally omits the Executive's proposed "pay and pursue" model for early intervention, which would have required insurers to pay for early intervention services by in-network providers and pursue disputes thereafter via appeal.

- Part U -- The Adopted Budget intentionally omits the Executive's proposal to require licensure and registration by the Department of Financial Services for Pharmacy Benefit Managers.

*Article VII Proposal (S.7506-B)*

- Part XX -- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive's proposal to authorize investigations by DFS into prescription drug price increases with indicia of fraud and create a Drug Accountability Board. The modifications include lowering the price increase trigger for an investigation to a 50% price increase, including confidentiality protections, and allowing the Senate and Assembly to each appoint one member to the Board. - Part AAA -- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive's proposal by extending the existing excess medical malpractice insurance program for one year. (This part was formerly found at S.7507-A, Part T.)
- Part DDD -- The Adopted Budget institutes a \$100 cap on the amount a person pays in out-of-pocket insurance expenses for a 30 day supply of insulin.

- Part V -- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive proposal to authorize the New York Racing Association to use capital funds to build a new equine drug testing lab by including a technical clarification that the lab must be built at a university in New York.
- Part W -- The Adopted Budget omits the Executive proposal to authorize entry into the Mid-Atlantic Drug Compact.
- Part X -- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive proposal to amend sports wagering lounge restrictions by making technical clarifications.
- Part Y -- The Adopted Budget omits the Executive proposal to eliminate Quick Draw minimum size restrictions.
- Part Z -- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive proposal to extend pari-mutuel tax rates and simulcast provisions for one year.
- Part CC -- The Adopted Budget adds a proposal to extend provisions related to the Jockey Insurance Compensation Fund.

*State Operations (S.7500-B)*

- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive recommendation of \$1.02 billion.

*Capital (S.7504-C)*

- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive recommendation of \$234 million.

*Article VII Proposal (S.7505-B)*

- Part AA -- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive proposal to grant OGS permanent authority to enter into 15-year leases and authority to enter into certain PILOT payments to a ten year extender for the authority of OGS to enter into 15-year leases.
- Part BB -- The Adopted Budget omits the Executive proposal to require sexual harassment disclosures from State contractors.
- Part KK -- The Adopted Budget omits the Executive proposal to cut VLT Aid to all New York municipalities aside from Yonkers.

(This part was formerly found at S.7507-A, Part A.)
- Part Z -- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive proposal related to the EQUAL program by clarifying provider eligibility and expanding allowable expenses for non-capital spending and includes additional parameters on capital expenses. (This part was formerly found at S.7507-A, Part D.)
- Part AA -- The Adopted Budget accepts the Executive proposal to eliminate several public health programs and transfer administration of two programs from DOH to other agencies, including:
  - Eliminating the Health Occupation Development and Workplace Demonstration program;
  - Eliminating the Adult Cystic Fibrosis Assistance program;
  - Transferring the oversight of Comprehensive Care Centers for Eating Disorders from the Department of Health to the Office of Mental Health;
  - Transferring the Autism Awareness and research fund from the Department of Health to the Office for People with Developmental Disabilities.
  - (This part was formerly found at S.7507-A, Part E.)
- Part BB -- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive’s proposal by extending various provisions of the Public Health and Social Services law, except:
  - Extend the regulatory waiver authority to allow providers involved in DSRIP projects to waive duplicative requirements for 1 year instead of four years;

- Extend the income threshold exemption for Medicaid services to include court orders and conditions of eligibility for other public health programs for three years instead of one year;
- Remove provisions related to the extension of the Indigent Care Pool and Prescription Drug Cap as those were decided as part of the MRT II process;
- Add a provision to extend the New York State Health Insurance Continuation Assistance Demonstration Project for one year;
- Add provisions to extend the ability of pharmacists to administer specific immunizations to adults, and to continue authorization for collaborative drug therapy management until 2022.

- Part CC -- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive’s proposal to add fentanyl analogs to the list of Schedule I and Schedule II controlled substances by adding 13 fentanyl analogs to Schedule I, one to Schedule II, and omitting the proposal to allow DOH to add future analogs to the controlled substance list without legislative approval. (This part was formerly found at S.7507-A, Part M.)
- Part DD -- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive’s proposed fee increases for Environmental Health programs by accepting most of these increases, except for the increase in fees for children’s camps. (This part was formerly found at S.7507-A, Part P.)
- Part EE -- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive proposal on tobacco and vaping control proposals to:
  - Prohibit the retail sale of flavored vapor products, unless the product is approved by the Federal Food and Drug Administration through the premarket tobacco product application process;
  - Prohibit the sale of tobacco products, herbal cigarettes, or vapor products in pharmacies;
  - Authorize DOH to regulate “carrier oils” that are suspected of causing illnesses;
  - Prohibit the use of coupons and other price reduction instruments for tobacco products and vapor products;
  - Prohibit the shipping of vapor products to any person in the state, except if they are a registered vapor products dealer or export warehouse;
  - Require vapor product and electronic cigarette manufacturers to disclose ingredients, byproducts, and chemicals of concern of the products;

  - Create an electronic cigarette and vaping prevention, awareness, and control program to educate students, parents, and school personnel about the dangers of vapor product use;
  - Prohibit the public display of tobacco products, electronic cigarettes, or vapor product advertisements near schools; and
  - Increase penalties for violations of the tobacco or vape products control policies to a range of \$300-\$1,500 for a first offense (from \$300-\$1,000) and a range of \$1,000-\$2,500 for a second offense (from \$500-\$1,500).
 (This part was formerly found at S.7507-A, Part Q.)

- Part FF -- The Adopted Budget accepts the Executive proposal to rename the “Physically Handicapped Children Program” to the “Children and Youth with Special Health Care Needs Support Services Program.” (This part was formerly found at S.7507-A, Part CC.)
- Part GG -- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive’s proposal to create a single state formulary for Medication Assisted Treatment prescription drugs for opioid use disorder by also including gene therapies and other “high cost” drugs in the single state formulary. (This part was formerly found at S.7507-A, Part EE.)
- Part HH -- The Adopted Budget includes an Executive proposal to expand access to telehealth in the Medicaid program.
- Part II -- The Adopted Budget includes pilot programs for medically tailored meals (MTM) for those with highly prevalent and costly conditions, medical respite programs for homeless individuals, and a street medicine proposal that allows Diagnostic and Treatment Centers to provide services to chronically ill individuals outside of a clinical setting.

- Part OO -- This provision expands wage parity enforcement provisions to require all covered home care providers to file annual compliance statements to verify compliance with wage parity hours and expenses, requires referrals of possible violations to the Department of Labor, establishes penalties for willful violations of the wage parity law for these home care providers, and requires notification to home care aides of the benefit portion of the minimum rate of their total compensation under the wage parity law.
- Part PP -- The Adopted Budget establishes several care management programs, including a diabetes and chronic diseases self-management pilot program, a provider directory for private duty nursing services for medically fragile children, a pilot program for promoting alternatives to opioid treatment for individuals suffering from chronic back pain, and a maternal health promotion pilot program.

- Part YY -- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive's proposal to:
  - Prevent insurers from denying claims for medically necessary inpatient observation and emergency services based on a provider's failure to satisfy administrative requirements;
  - Require product disclosure to providers;
  - Require insurers and health plans to use national coding guidelines in coding disputes;
  - Establish the healthcare administrative simplification workgroup;
  - Require insurers to prepare and submit to DFS annual and quarterly reports on health care claims;
  - Expedite the utilization review process regarding rehabilitation;
  - Prohibit retrospective review and denial of claims for COVID-19 treatment during a declared state disaster emergency; and
  - Require provisional credentialing.  
(This part was formerly found at S.7507-A, Part J.)
- Part ZZ -- The Adopted Budget creates a new funding pool to assist financially distressed general hospitals and nursing homes that are critical safety-net providers. The \$250 million pool will be financed by a two-year intercept of sales tax receipts from New York City (\$200 million) and other counties (\$50 million).
- Part CCC -- This provision would extend the Medicaid global cap through SFY 2021-22, allows for more targeted spending decisions when spending exceeds the global cap, removes the growth of local spending from being considered under the cap, repeals provisions that would allow dividend payments to providers if there is excess funds under the cap, and other technical changes to better reflect what happens when spending exceeds the Global Cap.
- Part DDD -- The Adopted Budget caps the out-of-pocket insurance expenses for a 30-day supply of insulin at \$100.
- Part FFF --The Executive proposed a carveout of the Medicaid pharmacy benefit from managed care to fee-for-service. The State would then be responsible for the administration of the drug benefit for all 6 million Medicaid beneficiaries. The Executive will review and adjust reimbursement for 340B providers, and will engage stakeholders for recommendations on the program. Proposals to eliminate prescriber prevails and reduce coverage for over-the-counter drugs were withdrawn.
- Part GGG -- The Adopted Budget provides limited liability for healthcare professionals, health care facilities, and organizations that donate their facilities for the COVID-19 pandemic response. The limited liability would apply for any health care services where treatment is impacted by the professional's or facility's response to the COVID-19 outbreak and in support of the State's directives. The limited liability expires at the end of COVID-19 emergency declaration. The professionals, facilities, and organizations would remain liable for harm caused by gross negligence or intentional and willful misconduct.
- Part KKK -- The Adopted Budget includes a proposal to increase penalties on managed care plans for late or inaccurate data, allowing managed care enrollees to receive electronic notifications on their benefits and services, and the creation of five-year pilot programs that authorize global payments for select providers.

  - Allowing the Commissioner of Health to impose additional eligibility requirements for surrogates to protect the potential surrogate's health;
  - Requiring more detailed information in the surrogacy agreement about the parties, their attorneys, gamete donors, and surrogacy programs, and requiring that the surrogate be provided with a copy of the Surrogate's Bill of Rights;
  - Requiring that the surrogate be notified of any potential impact on the surrogate's eligibility for public benefits;
  - Directing the Department of Health to regulate both surrogacy programs and other assisted reproduction services providers, such as gamete banks and fertility clinics. The regulations must prioritize the health of the surrogate or donor, as applicable; and
  - Providing more detailed direction to the Department of Health for the regulation of surrogacy and egg donation.
- Part V -- The Adopted Budget includes a new part that eliminates the current photo identification requirement for public assistance recipients. This part also allows public assistance recipients to access a free identification card from the state Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV).

  - The Adopted Budget allows the General Fund to borrow from special revenue funds for the length of the fiscal year, and not only for four months, as is currently the law.
  - The Adopted Budget allows the State to issue up to \$8 billion in short term bonds exempted from the rules of the Debt Reform Act in order to provide the State with liquidity in case of a cash shortage caused by lowered revenues and the shifting of the Income Tax filing date.
  - The Adopted Budget allows the Dormitory Authority and the Urban Development Corporation the ability to enter into a \$3 billion line of credit in the upcoming fiscal year and loan those funds to the State. The Public Authority Control Board will retain oversight over the use of this financial option.
  - The Adopted Budget exempts all debt issued in the fiscal year from the Debt Reform Act, except for the provision requiring debt terms to be no longer than 30 years.
  - The Adopted Budget establishes a Public Health Emergency Charitable Trust Fund to take donations to the state made to specifically deal with the Covid-19 crisis. (This proposal was formerly found at S.7505-A, Part VV.)
- Part LLL -- The Adopted Budget adds a new part to extend the statutory authorization for various legislative commissions for one year.

- Part Q -- The Adopted Budget omits the Executive proposal to modernize and merge real property tax forms and processes.
- Part R -- The Adopted Budget omits the Executive proposal to abolish the State Board of Real Property Tax Services.
- Part S -- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive proposal to remove references to the STAR Offset Program.
- Part T -- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive proposal to make technical amendments to the telecommunications and railroad ceiling programs by maintaining existing reporting requirements.
- Part U -- The Adopted Budget concurs with the Executive proposal to make exceptions for late Enhanced STAR filers.
- Part AA -- The Adopted Budget omits the Executive proposal to lower the income threshold for the STAR exemption program in order to shift more homeowners to the STAR credit.



- Part BB -- The Adopted Budget omits the Executive proposal to legalize adult use cannabis.

*Article VII Proposal (S.7506-B)*

- Part W -- The Adopted Budget modifies the Executive proposal to deny STAR benefits to homeowners with delinquent property tax debt to make it a suspension of benefits so when the property tax debt is paid homeowners receive back the amount of suspended benefits. Participants in the Enhanced STAR program will be exempted. This was Part O of S.7509-A.
- Part X -- The Adopted Budget advances new language giving employers the ability to opt out of the Employer Compensation Expense Program (ECEP) if they signed up by mistake.

*Article VII Proposal (S.7508-B)*

- Part WWW -- The Adopted Budget advances new language to decouple the State and New York City tax codes from the federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act.
