COMMITTEE JURISDICTION AND OVERVIEW

The New York State Senate Standing Committee on Mental Health has legislative oversight responsibilities for issues concerning the mental health needs of New Yorkers.

During the 2022 Legislative Session, 77 bills were referred to the Committee for its review. Of these bills, 21 were reported from the Committee. 9 were passed by the Senate, and 8 passed in both houses. This work was conducted through a series of 2 committee meetings. A list of all bills that were reported from the committee is provided at the end of this report.

COMMITTEE HIGHLIGHTS

The following key bills were acted on by the committee in 2022:

- S7753 (Brouk): Requires the Office of Mental Health and the Department of Health to conduct a study on the disparate impacts regarding postpartum depression screening tests
 - Chapter 384 of the Laws of 2022 requires the Office of Mental Health and the Department of Health to jointly conduct a study on the disparate impacts associated with postpartum depression screening tests.
- S7144 (Sanders): Provides crisis intervention team training, mental health first aid, implicit bias training and naloxone training to firefighters and emergency medical services personnel
 - Chapter 185 of the Laws of 2022 adds firefighters and emergency medical services personnel to ensure those professions complete the most up-to-date crisis intervention team training, mental health first aid, implicit bias training and naloxone training.
- **S5938 (Parker)**: Establishes a peer support services program for transgender and non-binary individuals
 - This bill only passed the Senate. The legislation would establish a peer support program for individuals who identify as transgender and non-binary, and would develop and establish regional and county-based services for these individuals. These services include but are not limited to peer counseling for mental illness including alcohol and substance abuse counseling, family support services, domestic violence, mental health and physical health.

TWO HOUSE BILLS

In 2022, 8 of the 77 bills referred to the Standing Committee on Mental Health passed both houses of the Legislature. Of these bills, the Governor signed 5 and vetoed 3.
