U.S. DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE Contact: - OFFICE ON VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN (OVW) JUSTICE FOR FAMILIES **PROGRAM**

Grants to USA and territories nonprofit organizations, government agencies, courts, legal services, and victim service providers to enhance services available to those affected by domestic violence and gender-based assault. Required registrations must be completed before applying.

This program is authorized by 34 U.S.C. § 12464. The Grants to Support Families in the Justice System program (referred to as the Justice for Families Program) was authorized in the Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act (VAWA) of 2013 to improve the response of the civil and criminal justice system to families with a history of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking, or in cases involving allegations of child sexual abuse.

The program supports the following activities for improving the capacity of courts and communities to respond to families affected by the targeted crimes: court-based and court-related programs; supervised visitation and safe exchange by and between parents; training for people who work with families in the court system; civil legal services; and the provision of resources in juvenile court matters.

Two new grant programs are available through the Environmental Protection Fund (EPF) for municipalities and emergency food relief organizations. \$1.2 million is available to municipalities for food scraps reduction, food donation and food scraps recycling (composting, anaerobic digestion, etc.) projects. \$800,000 is available to emergency food relief organizations to increase the amount of wholesome food available to those in need. Grants ranging from \$100 to \$15,000 to New York nonprofit organizations to enable emergency food assistance organizations to increase access to wholesome food.

Grants to New York City companies working in the entertainment industry for employee training, with a primary emphasis on activities that will increase creative, technical, and business skills. The purpose of this program is to help entertainment businesses grow. Consideration will be given to all proposals that will increase revenue and help employees acquire new skills and/or increase their compensation.

Grantees will work with program staff to design a proposal that will help the business earn more money and employees gain muchneeded skills. The grantee will supply the ideas; grant program staff will provide assistance in creating a proposal.

Proposals will be reviewed with the following questions in mind: -How much, if at all, will this training help your company increase its revenue in the next year?

-How much, if at all, will this training help your employees acquire new skills, responsibilities, and/or increase their compensation in the next year?

-Why do you need this support? Could you conduct or pay for training on your own?

-The better you can demonstrate that training will increase your revenues, enable your employees to develop critical skills, and that you need grant support to provide this training, the stronger the likelihood that your proposal will be funded.

The cost of training can vary widely depending on what kind of training you need; a good rule of thumb is between \$1,000 and \$5,000 per staff member. Recipients will be reimbursed 70% of the total.
